

#### **REFUGEE FAMILY CULTURAL EDUCATION**

Over the next several weeks there will be information in the bulletin describing the culture of Eritrea, the country where the refugee family is from.

#### Do you know.....

#### Eating

Years of drought, famine, and war have greatly affected the diet in Eritrea. The preferred meal is meat (chicken, goat, mutton, or beef) cooked with onion, garlic, red pepper, spices, and clarified butter. *Shuro,* a typical meal of garbanzo bean flour and spices, is cooked similarly. Lentils or other vegetables are served. Spicy main dishes, eaten for lunch or dinner, are complemented by *injera* (also called *taitah*), a sour pancake bread made of millet or maize flour fermented in water. Breakfast may include honey and *k'itcha* (unleavened bread), yogourt and *fit fit* (bits of sauce-covered injera), and *ga'at* (a thick barley porridge), or leftovers; tea sweetened with sugar is usually served. Muslims abstain from pork and alcohol.

Among highlanders, adults and children eat separately. Among other Eritreans, families eat together, although children eat separately when guests are present. In such cases, the hostess serves the guests and eats later with the children.

To begin each meal, the oldest man takes a piece of bread, blesses it, and offers some to each person. It is customary to eat with the right hand from a large communal tray set on a low table. Each person eats only the portion directly in front of him or her.



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The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

What Will We Yield? By Mary Katharine Deeley

Like many families, we planted a garden in the back yard to enjoy the flowers and teach our daughters where food comes from. Cucumber seeds, tomatoes, green beans, and carrots went into the soil. We watched for weeds and bugs. There wasn't a lot we could do about the squirrels. And we plucked the few items of produce our claylike soil allowed to grow.

In the process, I discovered two things. I don't have the patience or passion for gardening that some of my friends do, and I have the utmost respect for those who tend the fields and flocks that supply our food. Every seed they plant expresses their hope in the harvest. The farmer rejoices in what happens when seed, earth, and water come together.

So it is with God, who plants us on this earth and fills us with his word. We are God's expression for hope for the world. We are the ones through whom God can show forth his love to all. But today's parable in the Book of Matthew makes it clear that whatever ground is in our hearts and souls strongly affects the outcome.

If we are open, ready, and waiting, we will show forth the rich harvest of God's grace and righteousness. If our hearts are rocky or thorny, the yield will be like the handful of beans in my back yard, or it may be nothing and the world will not know God through us.

But we are fortunate. God is a far more patient gardener than I was and will continue to work the soil of our hearts and minds so that when we are planted, we may give a hundred times over the love that God has shown in planting us.

A parable is a story with a hidden meaning: we can easily remember the story, and gradually the true meaning becomes clearer and clearer.

Today is a famous example: the Parable of the Sower. In itself it is a story that would easily be understood by Jesus's audience - people who lived in an agricultural economy. Jesus uses their



understanding to make an important teaching about the message he has brought: it is like a seed that is thrown out and received in different ways the ideal is when the seed finds good soil, and produces a crop that can be seen and harvested: so the ideal listener to the word is one who allows it to lodge in the heart, but also produces a visible result.

What is the harvest we should yield, when we have heard the word?

#### "God's Word Yields Fruit"

#### This Week...

Any kind of growth is difficult. As we grow, we suffer and we learn. As seeds grow, they have to break open for shoots to form. Then, during their struggle, they can be choked, trampled on, or dried out before they actually become grain to be harvested. Although difficult, growth does happen - it happens with seeds, with people, and with the word of God.

#### For Your Reflection

This farmer who is sowing doesn't seem to have much of plan. There isn't an organized effort to prepare all the soil so that none of the seed is wasted. It's just thrown all over the place, with the hope that some of it will fall on good soil and grow.

- Do you think that is a good strategy for a farmer whose life depends upon successfully growing things? Why or why not?
- Why do you think God throws out seed to bad soil as well as to good soil?
- If our job is to spread the message of God, should we have a plan that is more dependable than this farmer's plan? Why or why not? What might such a plan look like?

Even if we are very deliberate about where we "sow the seeds" of God's message, we can't always control how people will receive it.

- Do you think it is better to aim for just the good soil, so that we mainly bring the message to people who are ready to listen to it? Why or why not?
- Do you think it is better so spend some time working the soil, so that dry, rocky, or thorny areas might become more fertile and ready to accept the see? Why or why not?

Not only are we asked to bring the seed of God's word to others, also we are asked to receive the seed of God's word from others.

- When do you feel like the good soil, fertile and waiting for God's word to come to you and bring you new life?
- When do you feel like dry, rocky, or thorny soil, not ready for God's word to grow within you?
