#### The Lord is My Shepherd

The prominent image for God in today's readings is the shepherd. This might be an unfamiliar image for city dwellers, but it is a very rich religious image. The Bible tells us that early Israelites were herders, so they knew a lot about shepherds. They knew that shepherds follow the wandering of their sheep and attended to their needs—not the other way around. They knew that shepherds lived with their sheep in the hills for long periods, away from family, friends, and the comforts of life. They knew that shepherds helped birthing and dying. They knew that all of this is a messy, smelly business, and no job for the fastidious.

Many nations of the ancient world, Israel included, thought of their kings as shepherds of the people leaders who should be willing to do for their people what the shepherd does for the sheep. This explains why, on the feast of Christ the King, we represent our king as a shepherd rather than a victorious military commander, as many kings are. But more than this, throughout his life— at his passion and death, and now in his risen glory— Christ cares for us and leads us as a shepherd does. He embraces the messy, smelly reality of life. He is a shepherd-king, intent on our needs, searching for us when we seem to be lost. How comforting it is to know he carries us on his shoulders

#### FAMILY CONNECTION

In today's Gospel, Jesus teaches us that we will be judged on only one thing: the acts of mercy we have shown to the least among us. Jesus identifies with the least ones; thus we serve Jesus whenever we serve one of the least ones. The Church calls the actions that Jesus described in today's Gospel the Corporal Works of Mercy. These works are to feed the hungry, to clothe the naked, to bury the dead, to shelter the homeless, to visit the sick and imprisoned, and to give alms to the poor. In these actions we show God's compassion and mercy to those in need.

As you gather as a family, recall the list of the Corporal Works of Mercy. Talk about some concrete examples of how your family might do these actions in your community and then discuss why it is important that we do these things. Read Matthew 25:31-46. Ask: Why does Jesus say we ought to do these works of mercy? (Because whenever we show mercy to another person, we show mercy to Jesus himself.) Choose one Corporal Work of Mercy that your family will act upon this week. Pray together that your family will see and serve Jesus in the least ones among us. Pray the Lord's Prayer or an Act of Love.

#### ACT OF LOVE

O my God,

I love you above all things with my whole heart and soul, because you are all good and worthy of all my love.

I love my neighbour as myself for the love of you.

I forgive all who have injured me and I ask pardon of those who I have injured. Amen.

# Sheep or Goat? Corporal Works of Mercy

Matthew 25.31-46 might make you feel confident, uncertain, or both. But fortunately the Church provides us for some guidelines for how we can serve Christ by meeting the physical needs of others. These are called the **Corporal Works of Mercy**:

Feed the hungry Visit the sick Give drink to the thirsty Visit those in prison Give alms to the poor Shelter the homeless Bury the dead

Let's start with **feed the hungry**. We all hear of people in our communities who lose their jobs or for one reason or another can't just go to the store and buy the food they need to sustain themselves.

- Have you ever volunteered at a foodbank or soup kitchen?
- What is one practical thing you could do to help somebody who is hungry?

Next is give **drink to the thirsty**. With water readily available to us from the faucet, we might not consider that thirst can be a problem.

- Have you ever considered that there are people in the world who are thirsty?
- Why might somebody be thirsty and how can we help?

We should shelter the homeless. There are homeless people throughout our communities.

- Have you ever encountered a homeless person? If so, how did it make you feel?
- What are some ways we can help provide shelter for those who don't have it?

What about **visit the sick**? Being sick is miserable, and a visitor can help take their mind off of how they feel.

- Have you ever known somebody who was seriously ill?
- Are you comfortable visiting someone who is sick?
- If you can't visit somebody in person, how else can you help?

Visit those in prison. This can be difficult, because most of us can't just go to a prison and visit a random person.

- Do you think prisoners deserve our help?
- If you can't visit a prisoner, what is something else you can do to assist?

Bury the dead. This doesn't mean pick up a shovel and dig a grave. Most of us will never do that.

- What are some ways we can help bury the dead?
- Have you ever grieved the death of a loved one?
- How can the community comfort those who are grieving?

And finally, give alms to the poor.

- What are some ways you can give alms to the poor?
- How can you take a leadership role in helping those who don't have enough?

Lord, teach me to be generous; Teach me to serve you as you deserve, To give and not to count the cost, To fight and not to heed the wounds, To toil and not to seek for rest, To labour and not to seek reward, Except that of knowing that I do your will. Amen.
