INSTRUCTIONS FOR ATTENDING MASS

Due to the latest Public Health Order, a maximum of **30 people** may attend Mass.

Note that Saturday evening/Sunday Masses have been postponed until further notice.

- At least two-metres physical distance is to be observed at all times, <u>even with masks on</u> (masks are an additional measure of protection).
- Please follow the instructions of the Hospitality Ministers (Ushers) and Father Louis.

 - People with COVID-19 symptoms, who live with someone with COVID-19, or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19
 - Those who have travelled to/from a "hotspot", outside of Saskatchewan or outside Canada within the last 14 days
 - Those who are waiting for COVID-19 test results

A Note from Your Pastor

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

First of all, I would say that we are in a really difficult time. Although most of us have been vaccinated for the first time, the new cases of Covid is increasing in our area and throughout our province. In order to protect you and to continue to have a safe place for worship, I have decided that we will not have weekend Masses for two weekends (April 17/18 and April 24/25). This is a really difficult decision for me because, as a priest, I love to welcome people to gather around the Altar to celebrate the Eucharist. However, we should take a break for two weekends and then we will come back together as a parish family when we receive a new announcement from Public Health and the Diocese.

We will continue to have Daily Mass for <u>30</u> people as scheduled. Please follow the bulletin online and come as you can. Otherwise, please stay home, keep safe and follow the Masses online as you have done in the past.

In the readings for this weekend we hear that the disciples are gathered in fear. This is exactly what we are facing now.

When the Risen Lord comes to them, he doesn't blame them for failing him. No, there is no blame, no accusations at all. He knows how they are feeling and he brings something they really need – **peace**. Peace is a wonderful gift from the Risen Lord: "Peace be with you", he says. He says it not once but twice, and, in receiving his peace, the disciples receive His forgiveness too.

Remember the Risen Lord doesn't give this peace before his resurrection, but after, and he gives it because they need it. Christ's peace is the solution to most endemic diseases of modern, secular society: stress, depression, and anxiety...

We all have been affected by Covid disease in one way or another. As our friendship with the resurrected Lord grows deeper, we are gradually healed, because he brings us his three different levels of peace:

Peace for our mind. When we look at his wounds, which he still bears in his glorified body, we know that his forgiveness is everlasting. Once he forgives our sins, we are truly forgiven. Our conscience can be at rest, and we have peace in our mind.

Peace for our heart. When we see the marks on his hands and feet, we know that we are loved with an undying, unconditional love. It is Christ's love for us, and then we have peace in our heart.

Peace for our soul. Christ is alive, and he is ruling and expanding an everlasting Kingdom. And he has invited each one of us to help him to do that by building up the church community. When we do that, we have peace in our soul.

My dear sisters and brothers, Easter doesn't take away our pain or remove our fears. But it does introduce a new perspective. It gives a meaning to our pain. It lights us with hope. All is different because **the Risen Lord is alive** and speaks his words of peace to us as he spoke them to the apostles: "Peace be with you". I invite all of you to be open and welcome the peace which comes from the Risen Lord.

I will miss you for two weekends, and hope that we can be together again soon. All of you are in my prayers. Have a wonderful week, stay home and be safe. Peace.

Sharing Our Wounds By Fr. Mark Haydu, LC

The glorified Jesus is not easy for the apostles to recognize. There is a deep truth here. The Twelve are startled and terrified to see Jesus again. In fact, they even think they are seeing a ghost. Their fear and lack of faith makes it impossible to see him for who he is— their resurrected Savior. Before they can truly see, they need to first accept him and believe.

And how does Jesus prove his identity to them? He shows them his wounds, the signs of his suffering and crucifixion. We often want to hide our wounds. We are ashamed of them and afraid of how others will react if they really knew. But Jesus, unashamed, shows his wounds and uses them as signs of who he is.

There is a message for us here. We need to allow our brokenness to find fullness and resurrection in Christ. It is at that point that the love of God is perfected in us. First, we need to acknowledge our wounds and not bury or hide them. Then we need to admit our need for healing.

Finally, through prayer, confession, and help from those who love us, we allow Jesus' redemptive love to wash over our wounds and give us renewal, rebirth, and healing. As a result, like Jesus, we will no longer be ashamed of our wounds, but rather we will share them as evidence of the power of Jesus Christ.

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Catechism Themes: The Mission of the Church (CCC 849-856)

"All of you are witnesses to everything that has happened." As witnesses, the early disciples were charged to tell others what they saw. Not only did Jesus command them, the Spirit impelled them to preach to all nations as the Father desired. Hence the missionary activity of the early disciples, as it is now in the Church, stemmed from the activity of the Trinity. As Father, Son, and Spirit are now working in the world, they desire that we, the Church, lead all people into union with the Godhead.

As the commentary above implied, we are called to share what we have seen, heard, and touched with others. We, like the early Christians, are to witness to God activity in his creation and among his people. Witness involves speaking the truth in love. Telling others God's truth about faith in Christ. Extending God's love (that we enjoy) to others. The cost of this endeavor is high for it leads to the cross. The reward is that much greater, for it leads to the resurrection.

How has your Christian experience change you? How have you had to change in the face of Christian witness?

Over the past two weeks, the Sunday gospels have recalled the confusion and fear caused by the Resurrection. They have also echoed Jesus' greeting of Shalom that soothed the emotions of the early followers. This Sunday added a new element to the disciples' vision experience: a context for understanding. This context would sustain the changes the Church would undergo in its first few generations of believers.

We, like most Christians, are tempted to take the context for granted. The Good News might become the old news. To shake off this inclination, let us place ourselves in the company of those who first heard the words of the two from Emmaus. Better yet, let us place ourselves in the company of those who evangelize others by word and deed. Let us walk with those who serve the poor and needy in the name of Christ. Let us walk with those who serve the children or those outsiders who seek Christ. In the mere process of being witness, the context comes alive. For Christ walks with us when we serve others. Alleluia!

Reflect over your experience of the past Easter. If it hasn't sustained you, plan to seek out others who will help you rekindle the Easter fire. Spend some time with those friends. Listen to their Easter stories and their Christian passion. If your experience has sustained you, seek out others you can encourage and enlighten.

It is such a struggle to turn away from sin. Jesus knows that. We try to follow his ways, but we sometimes fail. And we are deeply trouble. That is where repentance and forgiveness come in. RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
