3. <u>Please wear your mask</u> from the time that you leave your vehicle, and from the time you leave the church until you arrive at your vehicle.

My Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

In the Gospel for this weekend we hear a story of Peter's profession of faith in Jesus. Peter was only one in the group of twelve disciples who made his great declaration of faith in Jesus, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God". And, in return, Jesus responds that Peter is blessed, and he will be the rock on which Jesus will build His Church.

We all know this story, even every detail of it. Therefore, I will not re-tell the story in my message but I invite you to reflect on the personality of Peter, a special disciple with many good characteristics.

Let us take a close look at the relationship between Jesus and Peter. I think it will help us to grow as disciples of Jesus, and it will show us how best to help those whom we love.

Peter has a vocation. One day, at the shore of the Lake of Galilee, the Lord sees Peter and his brother Andrew washing their net and invites them to "follow me and I will make you fishers of people". Immediately, Peter leaves everything and follows Jesus.

The Lord is inviting us but in different ways. He may say to us, follow me, I will make you a good husband or a good wife, I will make you a good Christian or I will make you my witness. Are we immediately leaving something behind to follow him?

When Jesus calls Peter, he obviously sees potential in him. We all need someone to believe in us. It is hard to believe in ourselves if no one else believes in us. Peter does not think that he deserves the call. He himself says "Lord, depart from me, for I am a sinful man". Jesus does not deny that Peter is a sinner, but he challenges Peter to grow.

We need to be challenged. Demands have to be made on us. Not to have someone demand anything from us is to condemn us to unfruitfulness.

Peter himself fails the Lord. In giving authority to the man, who denies him, Jesus wants to show that he is establishing His Church not on human strength, but on his own love and faithfulness. The Church's true foundation is Christ himself.

Jesus asks Peter to declare his loyalty. Once when a large number of people leave him, Jesus turns to Peter and asks, "will you also leave?" This question causes Peter to look into his own heart and to stand up for Jesus. Do we look into our hearts to see how deep our love is for the Lord?

Jesus corrects Peter when he takes the sword in the Garden of Gethsemane in order to prevent the soldiers from arresting Jesus. He says to Peter, "Put away your sword". Using violence or weapons is not always right. Sometimes when we acknowledge God's will, we have to obey and accept the challenge.

Jesus understands that when Peter denies him, he does so more out of weakness than out of malice. He forgives him and gives him a chance to start again. We also need someone who can understand our weaknesses, and who does not write us off when we do not bear good fruits right away. My dear sisters and brothers in Christ, Peter's story is our story. Sometimes we are strong and other times we are weak. Without a warm, loving relationship with Christ, we are only Christians by name. We are like someone talking about love compared with someone who is in love. We learn from Peter for he allows God to work through him. Yes, like Peter, let us allow God to correct, challenge and lift us up so we can continue our journey to follow the Lord.

Today when we hear this story we are invited to renew our relationship with the Lord, to go deeper and deeper in our relationship with him. When we have a strong relationship with the Lord, we are bricks for the Lord to build up His Church in this world.

I wish all of you a very blessed weekend, and enjoy the warm weather. We keep one another in our prayers, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic time. May God bless us all.



Saint Peter's Basilica is built on the tomb of Peter, which literally serves as the rock on which the Church is built. Peter states his faith, acknowledging Jesus as the Messiah and the Son of God, in the name of the other apostles. In reply, the Lord reveals his intended mission for Peter: to become the visible foundation of the Church.

This account also tells us that Peter's act of faith did not come through "flesh and blood," that is, through his human abilities, but through a particular revelation from God. By contrast, right afterward, as Jesus foretells his passion, death, and resurrection, Peter "began to rebuke him," denying that this would ever happen (Matthew 16:22). Jesus scolds him in return.

Peter shows his human weakness and what he is: a stone along the path on which men can stumble. In this scene, the drama of each soul and the history of the papacy and Church itself are anticipated. There is the joint presence of divine assistance, by which the papacy constitutes the Church's foundation throughout history, and human weakness, which is also evident through the centuries and can be transformed only through abandonment to God's action.

In today's Gospel, Jesus clearly promises the forces of evil will not prevail. Prophets such as Jeremiah (1:18–19) were threatened only by human enemies, whereas Peter will have to be defended from a supernatural evil. Jeremiah receives a promise that affects him as a person and his prophetic ministry; Peter receives assurances concerning the future of the Church and the new community founded by Christ "upon this rock."

Your St. Gerard Parish COVID-19 Questions Answered

On March 18, 2020, Archbishop Donald Bolen, in keeping with the Code of Canon Law no. 87, granted to all the Catholic faithful dispensation from their Sunday obligation. <u>This is still in effect</u>.

What does this mean? As Roman Catholics, we have an obligation to attend Sunday Mass. Until further notice, Archbishop Don has granted an exemption from this obligation. For those who are unable or choose not to attend Sunday Mass at this time, you do not have to. Other ways to participate in Sunday Mass is to watch it on television or watch the YouTube Mass online, courtesy of Resurrection Parish & Christ the King Parish (Regina) and the Archdiocese of Regina.

What happens if someone at Mass develops COVID-19? All parishioners who have preregistered will be contacted.

Why do I need to wear a mask? All those who attend both daily and Saturday/Sunday Masses are asked to wear a mask. The parish has a small supply of fabric masks for those who do not have one. Please remember to put your mask on before exiting your vehicle prior to entering the church.

Why do I need to register each time when I would like to attend Mass? We are blessed at St. Gerard's to have a large parish family! <u>In order to provide all parishioners with an equal opportunity to attend Sunday Mass</u>, it is necessary to register each week.

Why can't I sit in my usual place? In order to accommodate as many singles, couples, and families as possible, it is necessary to assign seat numbers so that all are able to celebrate safely.

Carefully attending [to the directives] is the best way to ensure that we won't contribute to the spreading of the virus, and the most helpful step we can take in convincing government and health officials that opening our churches to larger numbers is a safe and responsible thing to do.

"The Keys to the Kingdom"

This Week...

The Gospel suggests that the key to knowing who Jesus is lies in using the power to forgive others. We all have that power. To experience forgiving another person is to experience the forgiving power of Jesus and to know who Jesus is and what his kingdom is like.

For Your Reflection

Keys are a symbol of trust and authority, along with responsibility.

- When have you been given keys? Do you have a key to your family's house? Your family's car? Your place of work? A room at school? What responsibility comes with being entrusted with a key?
- Have you ever locked your keys in a car? Have you ever locked yourself out of the house? If so, how did it happen? How did you feel? What did you do?

A rock is a symbol of solidness and strength. Rocks are hard to break, but they can break other things easily.

- Why is a rock a good symbol for faith?
- How would you describe your own faith? Is it as strong as a rock? Or is it more like a soft, weak substance, such as mashed potatoes, shaving cream, or a dried-out, crumbling leaf?

Peter isn't perfect. Remember, before Jesus is crucified, Pete denies him three times, just as Jesus predicted he would. Yet Jesus trusts him to be the leader of his disciples.

- Why would Jesus trust Peter to be the leader of his disciples?
- If being perfect is not a condition for having faith, what are the qualities that mark a strong faith?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
