A Note from Your Pastor

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

I would like to begin my message for this weekend by saying that through today's Gospel, we can see God himself, through his Son, who has come to accompany us on our journey, and who tries to teach us that He is the Bread of Life who sustains us on our pilgrimage toward eternal life.

The Jewish people know Jesus, where he is from and who his parents are, so it is difficult for them to accept and believe that he is "the bread that has come down from heaven". Their earthly knowledge and reasoning are not enough. They need to have faith.

How about us? In order to understand the real meaning of "*I am the bread that came down from heaven*" we need to acknowledge three important points in the Gospel today:

First, Jesus points out the mystery of faith, the faith "that no one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draw them; and I will raise that person up on the last day".

It is very clear that Faith in Jesus Christ helps us to realize that we need him, and yet faith in Jesus is God's gift - no one can get it on their own.

When we receive a small host, we are unable to see that Jesus Christ is truly present there: body, blood, soul, and divinity. But we know that he is. We have received Jesus; we have been given the gift of faith. This is why, as a priest, I solemnly proclaim "*the mystery of faith*" after the consecration at each Mass.

<u>Second, this faith in Christ leads us to "eternal life"</u>. As we hear at the very end of the Gospel, Jesus tells us that "*whoever eats of this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh*". We receive Jesus, and through this we are in communion with him and with God. At that very moment we are in a true, deep, personal, and intimate relationship with him, the kind of relationship we all desire. God never keeps his distance from us sinners. He wants us to know him, to be with him and to share his life.

<u>Third, Jesus himself is the "bread" of this eternal life, its source and sustenance</u>. How can we live without bread, without food? Our physical life will perish if we have no food. The same is true of our spiritual life: without Jesus, without his "*flesh for the life of the world*" in the Eucharist, our life of intimate communion with God would perish. It's that simple - and it's that crucial.

My dear sisters and brothers, to conclude my message, I have two suggestions for you to do:

- 1 Let us activate our faith, so that as we continue with this celebration of the Eucharist, to which the Father has drawn us, we will allow the Lord to strengthen us for everlasting life for which he offered his life to give us. And, more specifically, I invite you all to come to church to celebrate, to participate, to be with the Lord in the Eucharist. We will gather together as a family to celebrate the Bread of Life.
- 2 When you receive the Holy Communion, receive it with reverence, in a proper way, by extending your hands high enough, responding "Amen" clearly, and consuming it immediately, full of love and appreciation. And then after you consume it, in silence tell him how happy you are when you are in communion with him, and ask him to remain in you and fill your heart with great joy and holiness. Tell him in simple words: Lord Jesus, I love you, thank you for being with me. I love you for you are my bread of life. Strengthen me and journey with me.

I wish all of you a blessed weekend. Enjoy your time with your family members this weekend. Love you all.

News from the Archdiocese of Regina

Reconciliation and healing for residential school survivors and their communities– financial appeal announced by Saskatchewan bishops:

The five Catholic bishops of Saskatchewan on July 13 released more details about a planned fund-raising appeal entitled "Catholic TRC healing response." The Saskatchewan bishops said that the appeal's goal is "to support Residential School survivors and their communities and to engage more deeply in our own ongoing commitment and response to the Truth and Reconciliation process" with funds going to the priorities of healing and reconciliation; cemeteries on the sites of former residential schools; and education and cultural support. "We are collaborating with potential participants, and consulting with Indigenous dialogue partners, including Survivors, Elders, Knowledge Keepers, Chiefs, and other community members.

Out of these conversations, each diocese and eparchy will discern and communicate separately how they will proceed with the Appeal in their respective dioceses and communities," said the bishops.

The Opposite Reaction By Kathleen M. Barsi

Go and learn the meaning of the words, "I desire mercy, not sacrifice."

Matthew 9:13

Mercy. It's such a familiar word. It bookends every Mass, rolling glibly off our tongues until it's more a catch phrase than a word with real meaning. Really, how much is there to say about God's forgiveness?

When I dug into it, though, I realized my definition was too limited. Mercy isn't just something God gives to us. It's something we're called to give to others. Nor is it just about forgiveness. It's about the attitudes that shape our actions.

Think of that one person who knows all the right buttons to push and does so with glee. You can spend your whole life tied up in knots about how or whether—to respond. You can waste countless hours and endless emotional energy locked inside your head, having arguments with this person, putting words in her mouth that she never spoke and assuming the worst about her intentions. You might even write off the relationship altogether.

Mercy calls us to do the opposite. Mercy invites us to open our minds and hearts to the people we find most difficult. What influences have shaped them? What wounds are hidden beneath their antagonism? Mercy asks us to consider the things we cannot know and approach conflict with a spirit of compassion rather than judgment. In short, give people the benefit of the doubt.

This is not easy. In fact, it's superhuman. That's why we need God's help. That's why we need to receive the sacraments regularly—because they offer us the spiritual nourishment we need in order to do the real work of Christian living. And what is that real work?

"For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me" (Matthew 25:35–36).

This passage, the source of the corporal works of mercy, leaves no doubt that the work of mercy is the heart of Christian discipleship and the standard by which we will be judged at the end of time. There is no distinction between those who deserve help and those who do not. We are called to show mercy to everyone.

"Food for the Journey"

This Week...

Elijah is exhausted and ready to give up. But an angel brings food and drink to nourish him for his journey. Jesus is telling the crowds that he is their food for the journey. His flesh and blood are all the food we need. Paul tells us to forgive one another and to love others the way Jesus loves us.

For Your Reflection

Elijah is exhausted and ready to give up. He asks God to take his life.

- Have you ever felt that way? If so, what were the stresses and pressures that led you to that point? How did you get through it? If not, do you know anyone who has felt that way? Can you imagine being in that situation? What would you do?

Elijah doesn't want to take care of himself. He just wants to die. But an angel tells him to take care of his bodily needs or he won't have the strength he needs for the journey ahead.

- Do you take good care of yourself? If so, how? If not, why not? Do your parents ever encourage you to take better care of yourself? What do they tell you? Does it make sense? Do you follow their advice? Why or why not?

God has big plans for Elijah, who already has done so much work telling people about God. And God is there for Elijah, helping him out when he doesn't know what to do or where to go.

- Do you think God has big plans for you? Why or why not? What might God's plans be for you? What are your plans? Do you think your plans will ever get in the way of God's plans? Do you think God's plans could ever get in the way of your plans? Why or why not? How can someone figure out what plans God has in mind for their life?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
