In Touch with the Word

King of the Jews

Scripture:

- 2 Samuel 5.1-3. David is anointed the king of Israel.
- Colossians 1.12-20. Through Jesus we have forgiveness of sins. We were rescued from the darkness and brought into his kingdom.
- Luke 23.35-43. Hanging under the sign that declares him to be the King of the Jews, Jesus forgives the criminal who repents. They would see each other in paradise before the end of that day.

Theme:

Jesus is descended from David, the king of Israel, yet he is a king of another kind, ruling over life and death, freeing us from sin and darkness. Working for the kingdom of Jesus is working for understanding and forgiveness in this world, and paradise in the next.

Reflection:

To imagine the fear and pain of such a vicious and physically tortuous death as crucifixion is difficult. Of the two criminals, one joined the crowd, screaming at Jesus and demanding that he save all of them if he was indeed the Messiah. The other one called Jesus by name and asked to be remembered.

- When you are faced with pain and fear, what do you do? How do you respond? Do you scream and cry and lash out at someone nearby? Do you calmly endure? Or do you react in all these ways?

Jesus rules over life and death. Sometimes that can be more frightening than comforting.

- If Jesus can forgive a thief, is there any sin he will not forgive us for if we repent? After all, how many of us are criminals?
- On the other hand, that thief seemed to be remarkable – rebuking the other one's mockery and calmly asking for forgiveness in the midst of such agony. When have you responded with such clarity in the midst of a difficult situation?

FAMILY CONNECTION

Understanding today's Feast of Christ the King may be particularly challenging. While we may not have a direct experience of kings or royalty, we have some sense of what these mean. We know that royalty have sovereignty over their kingdom. We know that those who are subjects to royalty offer them allegiance and honor. Christ is King in a way that is different from traditional understandings of royalty. Christ's kingship extends to all places, all people, and all times. Christ manifests his kingship through his death on the Cross, in which he offers salvation to all.

Recall with your children stories that you may have read about royalty. Talk with your children about what they have learned from these stories about what it means to be a king. Talk about what they have learned from these stories about what it means to be a subject.

Tell your children that this Sunday is the last Sunday in the Church Year, and on this Sunday, we celebrate a special feast called the Feast of Christ the King. Read today's Gospel, Luke 23:35-43. Reflect together on how the various people in this Gospel respond to Jesus on the Cross. Who in this Gospel recognizes Jesus as King? (the thief) What does Jesus promise the thief as a result? (The thief will be with Jesus in paradise.)

Talk about how your family will recognize and honour Christ the King. Pray together the Lord's Prayer and ask God to help your family to act in ways that show you recognize and honor Christ as King.

Bringing Home the Word **+**

The Cross: Altar and Throne

In his Gospel, St. Luke, the good doctor, often brings in kingly themes related to Christ's crucifixion. He does this to highlight that Jesus fulfilled the Jewish belief that the Messiah would unite the three important leadership roles—priest, prophet, and king. The inscription the Romans nailed to the cross above Jesus' head inadvertently supports the fulfillment of Old Testament prophecy—he was indeed the King of the Jews.

He was also the priest who offered his body as a sacrifice for the Chosen People: "It was Caiaphas who had counseled the Jews that it was better that one man should die rather than the people" (John 18:14). He is both the priest offering obedience to the Father, and he is also the victim who is offered on the altar of the cross. The cross is altar and throne because, as well as priest and victim, Jesus is also the king reuniting his kingdom under God the Father. In so doing, he undoes the sin of Adam, which had been the cause of this division.

Jesus' prophetic words, "It is finished," means he has fulfilled his mission as priest, prophet, and king from the throne of the cross. *The Catechism of the Catholic Church* (1047) sums it up when it says that as king and high priest, his sacrifice is total, universal, and definitive. Now all of God's creatures, man and beast, both natural and in the heavens, can return to the one from whom they came forth and who declared each one good.

CATECHISM THEME: CHRIST'S SECOND COMING (CCC 673)

Since the Ascension, Christ's coming in glory has been imminent, even though "it is not for you to know times or seasons which the Father has fixed by his own authority." This eschatological coming could be accomplished at any moment, even if both it and the final trial that will precede it are "delayed."

What images do you have of Christ's return in glory? What would happen if he arrived in a way unexpected?

As we prepare for Christmas, the Church reminds us of Jesus' coming at the end of the world. While this might seem contrary to the season, let us remember that whether Christ comes in glory or as a poor child, the results are the same. The Second Coming and Christmas invite us to come closer to the Lord. Both urge us to approach the Lord without delay, even through events of the world distract us.

Reflect on your anxieties this week. Bring them to the Lord. And pray for the peace to survive the unexpected.
