#### **INSTRUCTIONS FOR ATTENDING MASS**

- Pre-registration for Saturday/Sunday Mass is required. Online at <u>www.stgerard.ca</u> Monday to Thursday at 12 noon.
- Maximum 30 people may attend Mass.
- Each household must register separately.
- Masks are mandatory. This includes from the time you leave your vehicle until you return to your vehicle after Mass.
- Members of the same household may sit together at the marked seating.
- At least two-metres separation is required between households at all times, <u>even with masks</u> <u>on</u>. Please arrive early so that you can "check in".
- The following must stay home for the sake of the wider community:
  - People with COVID-19 symptoms, who live with someone with COVID-19, or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19
  - The sick, including those with a fever, cough, sore throat, runny nose, shortness of breath
  - Those who have travelled outside of Canada within the last 14 days

#### A Note from Your Pastor.....

My dear Sisters and Brothers,

As the solemn celebration of Christmas approaches, the liturgy of the Church for the last Sunday of Advent reminds us that when Jesus was conceived in his Mother's womb two great mysteries connected with that day.

The first is the mystery of God becoming man: The Incarnation. God has loved us so much that He became one of us, so that He could save us from sin and the meaninglessness that sin brings, and show us the way to a meaningful life: "*The Glory of God is human being fully alive*" (St. Irenaeus).

The second mystery is that God doesn't work out that plan of salvation for us all by himself. Instead, He asks for our cooperation. We can see it in today's Gospel when God invites Mary to become the mother of the Saviour.

It is possible for Mary to say "No", to reject this invitation. Mary could say, 'Thanks for the invitation, I really wish I could do what you want, but I'm just not there yet'.

Mary knows that God's plans are always wise and wonderful. So she puts herself at His service: "*Here am I, the servant of the Lord, let it be done to me according to your word*". By saying "Yes" she makes room for Christ in her womb to restore the fault of Adam and Eve.

Mary makes a complete gift of herself to God, and accepts the task God gives her even though she doesn't understand all the implications of it. She trusts that God would give her all the help she needs. She trusts so deeply in God that she is open to all possibilities. She gives up control over her future and allows God to use her in His plan.

I would say that we should follow Mary's example, making our contribution to God's work of salvation, however small it may be.

From now until Christmas, let's ask God for the grace to respond generously to His plan, as Mary did, especially during the Christmas season, so that our part in God's plan of salvation is sure to get done.

It is not always easy for us to keep a balance between doing our part and letting God do His part in his plan of salvation. As we prepare to welcome him into our hearts during Christmas, let's promise him that, through hard work and heartfelt prayer, we will always strive to do our part well.

Life imposes a lot of duties on us. Besides duties to ourselves, there are duties to others, and duties to God. Think about this: Where would the world be if we just thought of ourselves and insisted on doing our own things, seeking our own freedom, happiness and fulfillment independent of God and others?

The greatest thing in our life is: when "what we have to do" will be changed "what we want to do".

Have a blessed weekend and prepare yourself well to welcome the Lord. He is coming, He will not delay.

**Extreme Makeover: Home Edition** By Fr. Mark Haydu, LC

King David wants to build God a home! He had first built his own palace and afterward realized that he hadn't built a space for God—a place of worship and family communion.

It is admirable that David wants to give back, but do we have to take care of God or, rather, is it God who cares for us? Obviously, God doesn't need David to build him a house. The whole world is his. Didn't God build up David all along, bringing him to a place where he might consider offering God something in return? It is like children who want to give their parents a gift. First, they ask a parent for money or a gift idea. On their own, they cannot give.

God turns the tables on David, saying God will build David a house—an everlasting lineage to rule over the people. God will build something much bigger than anything David had ever dreamt of. He will build David a kingdom that will become a nation and give birth to a worldwide universal Church.

In the painting, The Annunciation with City by the Sea by Marco Palmezzano, Mary stands in front of an ornate house. She stands like us, at the entrance, welcoming God's coming. It was her yes that allowed the master builder to enter into our world to begin building this house, which became a Church.

Like Mary, we await Jesus. With her, let us say yes to him, celebrating the one who has established that house where we celebrate today!

#### CATECHISM THEME: MARY, MOTHER OF GOD (CCC 494-495)

The Church has always honored Mary, for she was the first to receive the Good News. Through Mary's "yes," God lived among his people. Mary gave herself completely to the work of the Spirit within her. And, implicitly, she gave herself to the person of her Son and his mission. Her obedience enabled her Son to save all humanity.

Mary is the "mother of Jesus" through her humanity. But, she is truly "Mother of God" because of God's paternity. Mary is the God-bearer ("Theotokos" in Greek), the one who bore the Second Person of the Trinity into the world. In her and through her, the world realized the mystery of the Incarnation, God made flesh.

# Catholics have honored Mary since the beginning of the Church. Do you have a Marian devotion? Have you ever meditated on the meaning of the Hail Mary? How has Mary's "yes" inspired you?

Human honour is, indeed, fleeting. But God's honor stands forever, even in the face of criticism. Mary accepted, even proclaimed, God's will in her life. She placed her future in the hands of the Father. Her example should inspire us to stand firm as Christians in today's ever-changing fads and fancies. Remember, the words of others may sting, but the Spirit of God burns within. The divine fire can withstand the darts others fling toward us.

Reflect on the sacrifice of others so you could receive the faith. Think of your parents and family and friends. How have they withstood criticism and prejudice for your sake? How can you honor them for their "yes?" How can you help pass on the faith, despite the cost?

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#### What if conditions do not allow me to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation in church?

Pope Francis addressed this issue in his homily on March 20, 20201:

"Do what the Catechism (of the Catholic Church)<sup>2</sup> says. It is very clear:

If you cannot find a priest to confess to, speak directly with God, your father, and tell him the truth. Say, 'Lord, I did this, this, this. Forgive me,' and ask for pardon with all your heart." Make an act of contrition, the pope said, and promise God, "'I will go to confession afterward, but forgive me now.' And immediately you will return to a state of grace with God."

**RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA)** is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

**Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church.** If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
