A Note from Your Pastor

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

The Liturgy of the Word of God this weekend reminds us that a strong relationship with the Lord is not optional for us if we truly want a fulfilling and complete life. A life without the Lord is a life without hope.

In the first reading Jeremiah describes the importance of a relationship with the Lord in terms of favourable conditions for growth and unfavourable ones: "Blessed is the one who trusts in the Lord, whose trust is the Lord. That person shall be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream".

Jeremiah condemns those who put their trust in human beings and turn away from the Lord, and he claims that if they put their trust in human beings, their lives will wither and harden like tumbleweeds in the desert with no roots and no fruit.

Completely placing our trust in the Lord changes our life! It doesn't mean we will not follow the earthly course of life and die, but it means that we will have a new source of life that weathers adversity, even the adversity of physical death.

In the second reading Paul teaches us that a life without the Lord is a life in vain, because a life with the Lord is a life redeemed and transformed by the resurrection into a life of hope. Indeed, Paul teaches us that if Christ wasn't raised from the dead, neither would we. If Christ did not conquer death in the resurrection, he did not conquer sin either, and therefore we would remain in a sinful life that is finite, fleeting, and there would be no reason to hope. Paul says this because Christ has risen from the dead, conquering sin and death not only for himself, but for those who believe in him. Therefore, we now live a redeemed life hoping that one day the Lord will raise us up from the dead too.

In the Gospel, Jesus helps us to see true happiness, or being blessed, through struggle, hardship, suffering and opposition, and not through prosperity, popularity, and pleasure that we might normally associate with happiness. Jesus teaches us that the true path to happiness in this world is paved with life's challenges and hardships. This reminds us that this world is passing and imperfect, and that the only dependable thing in life is our relationship with God. Hardships and challenges teach us to root our lives in knowing, loving, and serving him; then our lives will be like a tree planted by water, sending out its roots by the stream as in the first reading.

We need to have faith to accept this teaching of Christ. Faith allows us to recognize God's love behind all things, and to acknowledge God's presence in the Eucharist and wisdom at work in suffering. Sickness, betrayal, accidents, money problems, rejection, being made fun of because of our Christian beliefs - these things make us blessed, because in them we can exercise our faith in Christ. They make us more like Christ, who saved us by suffering all these things himself.

Jesus wants us to know him. And so he is telling us what he cares about the most by telling us exactly what he wants, what he came to earth to give us: blessedness. He wants us to be blessed with: happiness, a meaningful life, a fulfillment that goes deeper than the superficial kind that comes with money, or power, or material things. Jesus doesn't want us to waste our lives; he wants us to live them to the fullest.

Unlike Matthew's Beatitudes, Luke had a set of Beatitudes and Woes. Luke's Beatitudes comforted the poor, the dejected, and oppressed;

God was with them. His Woe's condemned the rich, haughty, and the arrogant; God would judge such harshly. In the time of Jesus, five percent of the population controlled 95% of the wealth. The few controlled the economy. So, Jesus, in Luke, could easily criticize the rich few.

While economic times have changed, the temptations remain the same. It's easy to forget the poor and the powerless. It's easy to get caught up in one's wealth and self importance. To focus on those in need (and away from the self), set up a family Poor Box. Place you change in the box and encourage your family members to do the same. Display the box in a prominent place to remind your family of those who God will truly bless.

Pursuing a Higher Moral Standard

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus offers a rather radical call to holiness. Many of us have a hard time accepting that we are all called to such levels of morality. Yet, read to whom Jesus is speaking here. The Gospel says his audience is everyone: his apostles, his disciples, and a large number of other people from around the region. The Second Vatican Council offers a reminder when it says, "Fortified by so many and such powerful means of salvation, all the faithful, whatever their condition or state, are called by the Lord, each in his own way, to that perfect holiness whereby the Father himself is perfect" (Dogmatic Constitution on the Church [Lumen Gentium], 11).

A key to progress in any personal area is keeping hungry, never being fully satisfied. The same goes for our faith and relationship with our Lord. If our goal is to be comfortable, to follow the path of least resistance, then mediocrity is our goal. Jesus is anything but mediocre. He proposes to us a high moral standard that isn't reached by coasting.

Our souls are hungry by design. They are never fully satisfied in this life because we desire the Infinite—we desire God.

Luckily, our Lord not only proposes a high moral ideal of holiness, but he also gives us his very Spirit so we can reach the heights he proposes. And so, we can pray with St. Augustine, "Give me what you command, and command what you will."

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YOUTH REFLECTION

"Blessed are You, Woe to You"

This Week...

Today is a day for looking at opposites. Sometimes we are blessed, and other times we are cursed, depending on where God is in our life. And sometimes when we are cursed by others, or by misfortune, that is when we are most blessed. How can we be blessed when we are feeling most cursed? The answer is in the paschal mystery – Jesus did not rise until after he died. Through death we receive our life. We are fools if we do not believe in a risen Christ.

How we look at comedy and tragedy can tell us a lot about our relationship with God and where we are heading.

For Your Reflection

This Gospel is a warning to examine the things that make us happy and sad.

- What kinds of things make you the most happy?
- If you have plenty of money, high social status, fine foods, and expensive material possessions, you might be drifting away from God. Why might this be true?
- What kinds of things make you sad?
- If you are filled with jealousy, greed, and lust, you might be drifting away from God. Why might this be true?
- If you yourself are living fairly well, yet things like poverty, oppression, and injustice still make you angry because they bring suffering to others, maybe you are coming closer to God. Why might this be true?
- If you feel joy and contentment when other people succeed, earn compliments, and experience good luck, then maybe you are coming closer to God. Why might this be true?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
