INSTRUCTIONS FOR ATTENDING MASS

- Pre-registration for Saturday/Sunday Mass is required. Online at <u>www.stgerard.ca</u> Monday morning to Thursday at 12 noon.
- Maximum 30 people may attend Mass.
- Each household must register separately.
- Masks are mandatory. This includes from the time you leave your vehicle until you return to your vehicle after Mass.
- Members of the same household may sit together at the marked seating.
- At least two-metres physical distance is to be observed at all times, <u>even with masks on</u> (masks are an additional measure of protection).
- Please arrive early.
- The following must stay home for the sake of the wider community:
 - People with COVID-19 symptoms, who live with someone with COVID-19, or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19
 - The sick, including those with a fever, cough, sore throat, runny nose, shortness of breath
 - Those who have travelled outside of the province or Canada within the last 14 days

A Note from your Pastor....

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Last week we reflected on Jesus as a healer. This week I invite you to continue to reflect, and to acknowledge Jesus, himself, is our hope. He dwells in our hearts, redeeming our fallen nature, and strengthens us against evil influences.

The readings this weekend remind us that if God grants us something we should show our gratitude by glorifying Him and doing His will, not running off and ignoring His wishes.

In the second reading Paul asks us that we should do everything for the glory of God or else we run the risk of working against Him. We can glorify God in everything we do <u>if we strive to do His will</u> in everything we do. And we know as the Lord has taught us: *love one another as He has loved us*. It means when we love one another, we are truly glorifying God.

Paul insists that Christianity is not a social group: we should show love and respect for everyone, Christian or not. We should act not only for our own benefit, but for the benefit of others. We are called to imitate Christ and the Saints on a daily basis.

In the Gospel there are some more details that we need to pay special attention to. Mark tells us that the leper "*came to Jesus*". He came to Him close enough so that he can kneel down in front of Jesus. Why would he do that when he knows that the law requires him to keep his distance from others?

I imagine that Jesus must have inspired confidence; the leper senses that Jesus will not reject him. He puts his hope and trust in the Lord - and he is right! Mark tells us, after hearing his request, that Jesus looks at the leper, having compassion and mercy on him, and is satisfied in saying to him "*I do choose. Be made clean*". Then the Lord touches him and heals him – something no one else could do or would do. Do we have that kind of confidence in Jesus?

My dear sisters and brothers, Jesus has chosen to stay as close to us as he was to that leper, by giving us the Eucharist. He invites us to come up close to Him, kneel down in front of Him, and pour out all our miseries, hardships, confusions, sins and needs to Him.

And when we come to Him, He will be generous with us as he was with this poor leper. This is the only way to experience the wisdom, meaning, and joy that comes from spiritual maturity.

We can come to Jesus and offer the same beautiful prayer that this leper says, "Lord, if you wish, you can make me clean, you can give me strength, you can give me light".

The leper receives a miracle, but then turns around and does exactly the opposite of what the Lord asks him to do. He is healed and does not glorify God as he was instructed to do. Therefore, he ends up hindering the Lord's work instead of helping it.

The Lord heals those who come to him, but he also knows that for many it will only be a band-aid for something deeper to be addressed and changed in their lives, something he has come to address and to fix definitively. We need friendship and communion with God to be truly healed and whole.

Friends help their friends to do good, not hinder them. Our Lord doesn't want to just be a miracle worker in our life; he wants to be our brother and friend.

Let's pray for an end to this pandemic. We put our hope in the Lord, and with Him we continue to persevere. Have a blessed week and enjoy the warm weather that is coming.

Preparing Before Lent Begins

Taking some time to get ready for Lent will ensure that we aren't going to miss the first week or two of Lent, because we are just getting started. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, but we want to be ready to really take off on that day, rather than just beginning to think about Lent on that day. Part of what makes a vacation or a special anniversary so special is the build-up to it.

Before we get to Ash Wednesday, we should start asking ourselves some questions and we should start with some preparations. "What does God want to give me this year?" This question may require that I slow down a bit and listen to my inner spirit. For example, even if I'm very busy, I realize I'm hungry when I hear my stomach start "growling." "What am I going to be doing on Ash Wednesday?" Too often, Ash Wednesday is like every other day, except that I manage to get to church and get ashes on my forehead. Is there anything else I can do on Ash Wednesday? How will fasting and abstaining happen for me, for my family on that special day?

It doesn't a lot of time to prepare for the beginning of Lent. It just takes desire and focus. God can do so much with that. We can give God more of a space to touch our hearts if we begin to establish some simple patterns. We could wake up each morning, and for something like a half a minute to a minute, stand by the edge of our beds, and just ask the Lord for the grace to let this day be one in which I long for the beginning of Lent. Perhaps we need to ask for specific helps or graces to get ready to begin Lent. Whatever we try to say, our Lord can understand the Spirit trying to speak through our simple words. And all it takes is the time to find and put on our slippers. And each night, in the days ahead, we can practice giving thanks to God before I go to bed. This simple pattern, in the morning and evening can stir our spirits to look forward to and prepare for Lent, as a season of grace.

May our Lord bless us all on this journey ahead.

The Courage to Heal By Fr. Mark Haydu, LC

Leprosy was a highly contagious skin disease that led to certain death for anyone who caught it in Jesus' time. For good reason the Jewish law demanded that a leper live set apart and cry out as he walked along to keep everyone at a safe distance. Imagine the pitiful scene of everyone discreetly but purposefully moving away at the sound of someone shouting, "Unclean, unclean!"

Yet the leper doesn't shout to keep Jesus away. He walks right up to our Lord and confesses his faith in Jesus' power to heal him of this incurable bacteria. He humbly admits his contagious illness and places himself before Jesus. And unlike anyone else might do, Jesus doesn't run away, he walks toward him. He does the unthinkable. He touches him!

We need not be ashamed of our deadly sin that eats away at our heart and cripples our ability to love. Go to Jesus, expose it to him, and let his loving touch transform you.

The terrible disease of leprosy was still a major problem well into the nineteenth century when St. Damian, a Belgian missionary, went to the Hawaiian Island of Molokai to serve as parish priest to all the lepers quarantined on that island. Not fearing to touch them, he cared for them for many years until, as expected, he contracted the disease and died of it.

This is what it means to be a Christian! Be like Jesus. Be not afraid of your wounds or those of others, no matter how repellent, and give of yourself to care for them.

Everyone belongs to the family of God and has a role to play in that family. God, our Father, chose to share His love with us. Jesus Christ, His Son, has made known to us by His life and word this great message of love. This is called "The Good News". And all Christians are called to stewardship. As stewards, we recognize that all we have comes from God. Our possessions are given to us in trust. And as good stewards know, we are to cultivate these and return them with increase to God. Through our faith commitment to baptism, all have the responsibility of living this life of love and of bringing it to the people of God. As stewards, we use our unique gifts to build up the Church. This leads people to share the mission of the Church: proclaiming, teaching, serving, and sanctifying. We know we cannot do all things, but we can do what our gifts lead us to do. Thus, each one of us has the commission and task of bringing this Good News to the people of God in the Christian community. The Spirit of God is with us in this task. Every task-oriented community needs organization to accomplish its work so that all the persons and resources dedicated to the task can be used to the best advantage. Parish Pastoral Councils and Parish Finance Councils provide clergy, laity and religious with the necessary organization structure to carry out the task in a parish.

The laity are called, with priests, to fulfill the responsibility for liturgy, catechesis, pastoral care of the sick and elderly if the Church is to remain strong. Parish pastoral councils and parish finance councils are needed to organize the faithful to carry out those responsibilities. Therefore, as consultative bodies, it is critical that members of the Pastoral Council and members of the Finance Council work in cooperation with each other to bring about a life-giving Parish Community.

The parish pastoral council brings together lay people, religious and the pastor who work together to build the parish as a living Christian Faith community. The parish pastoral council members should care about the pastoral needs of their parish, of other communities in the archdiocese and of the universal church. They should strive to bring the Gospel message to all people in their neighbourhood.

The finance council is responsible for the administration of the financial affairs of the parish, being governed by universal law, the archdiocese financial and building regulations and by the norms laid down by the diocese. The finance council ... is the steward of parish material resources.

Lay Leadership is vital to our parish. Lay Leaders help to set the direction and vision, set goals and action steps that align with parish priorities, and implement these action steps.

Any registered parishioner who is fully initiated in the Catholic Church, is sixteen years of age or over, and worships regularly with the parish community, is eligible to serve on parish council.

Secretary - Records the minutes of all regular council and assembly meetings. Maintains those records for the parish files. Writes letters, thank you, or other correspondence with the approval of council. Ensures that each newly elected member is in possession of the current St. Gerard's Pastoral Constitution and the current Archdiocese of Regina Guidelines. Prepares highlights of the Parish Council meeting for the following Sunday bulletin.

Liturgical Committee - The Liturgy Committee consists of the following sub-committees: Sacristans; Altar Linen; Children's Liturgy; Ministries as Lectors, Welcomers, Communion Ministers, Communion to the Shut-ins, Hospitality and Altar Servers; Scheduling; Banners; Art and Environment; Music; and Office Liaison. Is responsible for working with the Pastor to promote, prepare, and provide for meaningful participation in all liturgical and para-liturgical celebrations. Shall, in conjunction with the Pastor, plan so as all members of the parish community may participate intelligently, prayerfully, and actively in liturgical celebrations.

Public Relations Committee – Keeps parishioners informed by means of newsletters and ensures the distribution of them. Promotes St. Gerard parish through the media. Maintains parish history, updates photo albums and scrapbooks, and arranges for photos/videos to be taken at parish functions.

Family and Social Committee- Organizes and carries out parish social activities, for example, the social functions associated with the Sacraments and Sacramental preparation. Coordinates coffee/lunch after Sunday Masses and for other occasions.

Community Life Committee - Sets up a "Welcome Ministry Team" for new parishioners, provides an information kit, and sets up a program to provide rides to Mass/parish functions for seniors and other parishioners in need of this service. Organizes newcomer socials. In cooperation with the Pastor, Hall Manager, and team captains, makes decisions on how best to serve funeral lunches for our bereaved families.

Social Justice Committee – Promotes education on the work of the Canadian Catholic Organization for Development and Peace, and promotes and administers the project during Lent.

Finance Council Chairperson – Shall carry out his/her duties as mandated in Article IX and X of the Parish Constitution. Shall present a detailed written financial statement and report at each meeting of council and be prepared to answer questions from council members. Prepares an audited financial statement for the annual meeting. Prepares an annual budget of the parish.

Hall Committee – Determines rental fees, approves operational regulations, ensures proper financial records, oversees the maintenance and repair of the plant, monitors the performance of the Hall Manager, and provides a separate financial statement in detail for the Annual Report and annual Meeting.

Properties Committee - Is responsible for the maintenance and operational care of the Church, the Rectory, the Hall, the grounds, and the equipment belonging to St. Gerard Parish.

"Reclaiming the Outcast"

This Week...

In Leviticus strict religious laws are stated; the unclean are to be separated and not touched by others. In Corinthians religious laws are put into perspective: living as Jesus lived is more important than the specifics of our diet. But Jesus goes the distance in the Gospel. He doesn't merely tell us that the old laws that are strict, disrespectful, and unnecessary are less important than our human interactions and the needs of others. He steps over the line by actually breaking the laws and bringing healing in the process. He touches the untouchable, and suddenly the one he touches is no longer untouchable.

For Your Reflection

Jesus tells this person that he cures to keep it a secret and merely go back to the priest, but this person tells everyone about Jesus.

- Do you think Jesus was angry with him for not keeping the secret?
- Why do you think he disobeyed Jesus?

Once Jesus' reputation spreads, many things happen. He often is followed by mobs of people, and he isn't able to get away and rest. He is often pursued not because of his preaching and his message but for his ability to cure and perform miracles. Because so many people believe in him, his influence grows, and the political and religious rulers are jealous and afraid of the power he is gaining.

- What do you think the Apostles thought of all this? If you had walked the roads with Jesus, what would you think of his powers and his knowledge?

- Would the large groups of people bother and inconvenience you? Would you feel popular and powerful as well? Would you be concerned with the political or religious leaders and their jealousy? Would you want to stay with Jesus or leave him? Why?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
