#### INSTRUCTIONS FOR ATTENDING MASS

- Pre-registration for Saturday/Sunday Mass is required. Online at <a href="www.stgerard.ca">www.stgerard.ca</a> Monday morning to Thursday at 12 noon.
- Maximum 30 people may attend Mass.
- Each household must register separately.
- Masks are mandatory. This includes from the time you leave your vehicle until you return to your vehicle after Mass.
- Members of the same household may sit together at the marked seating.
- At least two-metres physical distance is to be observed at all times, <u>even with masks on</u> (masks are an additional measure of protection).
- Please arrive early.
- The following must stay home for the sake of the wider community:
  - People with COVID-19 symptoms, who live with someone with COVID-19, or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19
  - The sick, including those with a fever, cough, sore throat, runny nose, shortness of breath
  - Those who have travelled outside of the province or Canada within the last 14 days

#### A Note from Your Pastor.....

My dear Sisters and Brothers,

I want to start my message this week by saying that there are many religions in the world, and most of them express that human beings are searching for God. However, for us as Christians, it is all about God searching. It starts with God, not with us. Now I invite you to reflect on this weekend's readings to see what I mean.

In the first reading from Jonah, the people of Nineveh are living sinful lives. Their lives are empty of meaning and lasting, true happiness. And God, as a God of love and mercy, His heart is moved with pity for these sinful people. He sends Jonah to wake them up, to put them back on track. That is, God's plan for human happiness. Through Jonah, God searches for the people of Nineveh, because He cares so deeply about their happiness.

In the Gospel, we hear the same thing. Mark tells us what Jesus came to earth to do: to call people into a deep personal relationship with God.

We recall how He calls His first disciples by name: Peter, Andrew, James, John. He calls them to follow Him more closely as we heard in the Gospel last week. He calls them, because he wants to give them more meaning, purpose, and, ultimately, happiness. He wants to bring them into His Kingdom.

My dear Sisters and Brothers, this is what the God of Christianity is all about: He comes in search of every human heart, calling us into everlasting friendship with Him.

There is no doubt that Jesus always has something to say to us. He is the "Word of God," and God is love, the love that never tires of speaking with the beloved.

Sometimes God calls us to make big changes in our lives, as He did with his first disciples on the shores of the Sea of Galilee.

God is always calling out to each one of us, because he loves us and wants to lead us to a more fulfilling life, both here on earth, and also for all eternity in heaven.

But there is a problem. And the problem is that **we are not always listening**. Indeed, we fill our lives with so much noise, that God's voice gets lost - we don't hear it, and so we cannot respond to it. If we really want to let God's call in our hearts resound, we must learn the value of silence.

We must give silence a chance. In our daily lives, we need to use silence to create that kind of a special room in our heart, where God's voice can resound.

Therefore, I invite you to:

- ❖ Spend fifteen minutes a day just with Him and for Him. It could be in your room, in a Church, in a park, or even in your office.
- ❖ Turn off all the noises and distractions such as your cell phone, iPad, TV..., and sit in silence with the Lord. Acknowledge the presence of God with you at that moment and pay attention to hear His voice.
- ❖ Take out the Sacred Scriptures, read and reflect on them, slowly and gently.
- ❖ Take time to look lovingly on the beauties of His creation and allow them to speak something to your heart.

My dear Sisters and Brothers, God is constantly telling us that He loves us and has a plan for our lives; from now on, let us make a commitment that we will pay attention to hear His voice.

Again, this week we continue to enter into the silence; allowing our hearts to simply adore the Lord who loves us; ask Him for the grace we need to respond generously, today and every day, to His personal call in our lives.

Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. Although the RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized, at St. Gerard we also prepare adults for the Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians (including Catholics) into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission. Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer. #### **God's Patient Call**

The Sistine Chapel fresco, The Prophet Jonah, is directly above The Last Judgment. Michelangelo chooses to depict Jonah for his theological connection to Jesus, who said, "Just as Jonah was in the belly of the whale three days and three nights, so will the Son of Man be in the heart of the earth three days and three nights" (Matthew 18:40).

Unlike Jesus, Jonah initially balks at God's call until he grudgingly accepts and preaches to the city of Nineveh. In his rebellion, he gets in a boat and goes the opposite direction from where God was calling. Eventually he was thrown overboard and swallowed by the fish, seen painted at his side. After a three-night stomach ache, the fish spewed Jonah up on the shore, back where he had started.

Jonah looks up to heaven with a weary longing, which might denote his melancholy personality. The fig tree further reinforces his weakness because it recalls the episode when Jonah lay under the fig tree in depression and lethargy.

Like Peter and Andrew, James and John, God entered Jonah's life and called him. Unlike the apostles, it took him a while to say yes. We can also be slow to respond to the invitation of God in our soul, whether in big or small things. Perhaps the attraction of the world or fear of sacrifice keeps us from saying yes. Yet his voice is constant and persistent.

Michelangelo paints Jonah dangling above *The Last Judgment* as if to subtly say, you are cordially invited to say yes to God's patient callings...while you still have time.

### Catechism Theme: Why a Sacrament of Reconciliation after Baptism? (CCC 1424-1426)

Why is there a Sacrament of Reconciliation after Baptism? To answer that question, we need to ask: why do we sin after baptism? The Catechism states:

"...the new life received in Christian Initiation (i.e., Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist) has not abolished the frailty and weakness of human nature, nor the inclination to sin that tradition calls concupiscence..."


The message ("Repent and believe the Good News") and call of Jesus ("Come and see") are actually one. To have a personal relationship with God's Son requires a constant spirit of repentance and faith in the gospel. While the key moment of repentance and personal faith in Jesus is Baptism, our response many times falls short. Many times, we need to renew our moral conversion and our faith choice. We need to experience the loving touch of God's mercy. The Sacrament of Reconciliation provides us such a time and such an experience.

How has your life changed when you chose to believe in Christ? How have you renewed that choice?

"Follow me." The invitation Jesus gave his early followers is the same he makes to us now. He invites us to change and believe. We need to realize he not only give us the challenge, he gives us the means to abandon our former life of sin and to trust in God. He gifts us with the Spirit. So, the call of Jesus is not only a direction; it is a helping hand. Human frailty may trip us from time to time, but the Lord will not disappoint. When we follow the Lord, he leads us and sustains us.

Try to look at your life this past week through God's eyes. Write down your spiritual successes and failures. How has God helped you with your successes? How have you disappointed God with your failures? Pray God renews your commitment to his Son this coming week.

With the Virgin Mother, beg the Lord to liberate the world from every form of pandemic. Amen.


#### Dear Parishioners:

#### YOUTH REFLECTION

### "Answering the Call"

#### This Week...

Things can happen so quickly. "What a difference a day makes - 24 little hours," as the song goes. Nineveh changes overnight because of Jonah's preaching. Simon, Andrew, James, and John immediately abandon their fishing nets to become fishers of men and women. Paul tells us to be prepared because these things can happen. He exaggerates the point so we know how urgent it is to be ready to alter our life completely for God.

#### For Your Reflection

When Jesus comes by, the fishers who choose to follow him are immediately changed. Their daily lives are no longer spent watching the weather, fixing their boats, and hauling fish. Yet it takes them several years to understand their faith in Jesus and what it means to be a true follower and disciple.

Some changes can happen quickly, and things are immediately different. Some changes happen more slowly, and you can only see the difference over time, while looking back with a thoughtful eye.

- When you made the switch from junior high to high school (or from elementary school to junior high or middle school), what were the immediate changes in your everyday life? What were the changes that took time as you matured and became more adult-like and more comfortable with your new surroundings?
- What are some of the immediate daily changes that might have taken place in the Apostles' lives and in the lives of their family members? What gradual changes do you think their family members would have noticed in them over the course of three years or so?
- When you want to change yourself, how do you get from the stage of "just thinking about it" to the stage of "actually doing it"? What are some changes you would like to make in your own life changes that would make you a better person, changes that Jesus would approve of?
- If you truly live that way every day making changes that Jesus would approve of, being a better person how will that make you like the Apostles? How might you become like a fisher of other teenagers, looking for a better life?

We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.
