A Note from Your Pastor

My Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

We now celebrate the first Sunday of 2022 and it is The Epiphany Sunday. We celebrate it as the first appearance of Christ to the Gentiles, represented by the Three Magi coming from distant lands. They come to pay homage to a newborn king. It gave a sudden insight into the deeper meaning of the Messiah because the word "epiphany" originally meant an appearance of something, often a divine being.

Christ was revealed as the Saviour, not for a select group of people, but for all people. The Epiphany is a beautiful feast because it brings everybody together. All now share the same inheritance; they are a part of the same body. (Ephesians 3.6)

God sent Jesus into the world to reconcile people with him and with one another. As people who reconcile with God through Jesus, we all have been given the ministry of reconciliation.

It is exactly what St. Paul says today in the second reading: "In former generations this mystery was not made known to humankind, as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: that is, the Gentiles have become fellow heirs, members of the same body, and sharers in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel".

Paul reminds us that people of all nations, not just Israelites, would be able to benefit from the promises Our Lord has made through the Gospel.

The Israeli people thought for a long time that salvation was reserved for them alone and that the Messiah would only come to save and lead them. We would see in the early Church how they struggled with understanding that the Gospel was not just for the Jews, but for Gentiles as well.

According to Paul, in Christ, the divisions between Jews and Gentiles would end. All of humanity was called to his light. The Three Magi in today's Gospel is the first sign of that fact.

Therefore, what we celebrate today invites us to see that the light of Christ extends farther than we could ever imagine. When we, as people, reconcile with God through Jesus, we have been given the ministry of reconciliation.

As believers, we have been drawn to the light of Christ, and we now bear it and can bare it to others. God wants to fill us with his mercy, and for that to happen, we need to open our treasures to him. We need to be a star to lead others to the Lord, to share our salvation with one another.

Pope Paul VI, in his splendid Apostolic Exhortation from 1975, *Evangelii Nuntiandi*, wrote: "Modern man listens more willingly to witnesses than to teachers, and if he does listen to teachers, it is because they are witnesses" (n. 41).

My dear sisters and brothers, we have come and seen. We know how great is the love and mercy of God. Now we are called to proclaim it in our lives. Let us pray that each of us will be a brightly shining star to lead others to come to be with Him, our Saviour.

Happy New Year to all of you and may the blessing of God be with you always.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the

friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience. The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.

Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.

2022 Giving Program

King Herod, the most powerful man in the region, was greatly troubled to hear about the birth of a king. Why would a reigning king fear a little child? Perhaps because he believed if word spread that a future messiah had been born, the Jews would be harder to control. They were easier to dominate when they were without hope, without a leader.

Herod was correct. Wise men from the East looking for the King of the Jews fulfilled prophecies that foretold all nations would come to Israel looking for a messianic leader.

Herod was also troubled because, if indeed this newborn was a king, he had a pretender and a competitor right under his royal nose. King Herod was correct again.

Although Jesus did not pretend to overthrow the Romans, he did come with authority and would upend the existing order. Jesus would preach to the heart and demand that no one sit on that throne except God his Father.

The painter, Pseudo Domenico di Michelino, in Adoration of the Kings, presents the arrival of the Magi as a procession of vassals showing homage to their king. Kneeling, bowing, and standing erect with gifts in hand, authorities from far away are reverencing the newborn royalty who sits on Mother Mary's lap. His royal hall is the hillside, his scepter a baby finger, his royal family is Joseph and Mary.

These Gentile kings were the first to do what all of creation and all of history have been doing since then—bending their knee to the King of the Universe. Herod was right to worry.

Catechism Theme: The Mysteries of Jesus' Infancy

The feast of Epiphany celebrates the revelation of Christ to the pagan nations. And it points to Israel's place as the source of God's revelation. The Magi came to seek the newly born King, the one who would be a light to the nations. Their foreshadowed the evangelization encounter success Christianity would have among pagan people who hungered for God's truth. Their encounter also acknowledged Israel as God's chosen people. They would be the source of God's blessing, a living fountain of God's revelation for all people. In the feast of the Epiphany, we rejoice in the worship of the first seekers. And we are reminded to honor God's people who gave us the great gift of Jesus, our Lord.

When have you searched for the Lord? When has that search encountered road blocks or deception or wrong turns? How has God kept you on track?

As we look back on the story of the Epiphany, let us remember who called, guided, and revealed himself to the Magi: God. The story was Goddriven from the first verse. Let us not forget God himself calls us from the surface experience of daily living to seek something higher, something better. He is the one who turns us from those who expect experience into those who receive grace, pure gift, at every turn. In God, we find someone to give our hearts, our minds, and our lives to. We find the goal of our quest.

How has God called you this week? How has God graced you this week? How can you pass your call and your grace along to others?

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YOUTH REFLECTION

"Following the Star"

This Week...

Isaiah foretold that nations would gather to follow the light and offer gifts. The story of the Magi has glamour, danger, and courage. It is a story of accepting the journey to an unknown place: following the star because of faith. And it is a story of Gentiles coming to visit Jews, bringing gifts, and being welcomed.

For Your Reflection

The astrologers in the Magi story went through quite a journey in search of the baby Jesus. They obviously believed in him and had faith in the star.

- → Have you ever "followed a star"?
- \rightarrow Have you ever gone after a dream or an ideal you believed in?
- \rightarrow Are you still going after it?
- \rightarrow What gives you the energy to keep going?
- \rightarrow How do you know it is worth it?

The gifts brought by the Magi have significance. *Gold* is a symbol of wealth and fidelity. *Frankincense* is burned to purify the atmosphere by releasing an aromatic and pleasing smell. For centuries, Native Americans have burned holy smoke in order to bless and purify themselves, and monks have watched incense rise to the sky as a symbol of their prayers ascending to God. Myrrh is a kind of resin or oil used for anointing and embalming. It is a symbol of comfort and soothing but it is also a foreshadowing of death.

- How were these gifts symbolic for Jesus?
- What three gifts would be symbolic of you and your life so far?
