A Reflection by Deacon Dave Hudy

Dear Friends,

This weekend's gospel invites us to ask the question "Why does God answer some prayers and not others?" I had a friend who prayed fervently for his daughter's recovery from cancer. He asked Jesus to take his life instead the life of his daughter. His daughter's healing was the focus of his life at the time, he would pray while working in the fields with his tractor. He told me that one time he could feel Jesus' presence in the tractor with him while he was praying. It felt like Jesus was riding along with him in the tractor. But, his daughter was not healed, she died from her cancer. Yet, God answered this family's prayers at other times, both this man and his wife experienced what I would call miracles of healing. My friend has since passed on from this life, I pray that both he and his daughter are now in heaven. So, why did God seem to let him down when he really needed help?

In our gospel, Jesus gets into trouble for the same issue, why some prayers answered and others are not. People are so angry that they attempt to throw him off a cliff. These people are from Jesus' home town and are expecting him to perform, at least, the same type of miracles that they heard he has been doing elsewhere. But Jesus implies that they will get no special treatment just because they are his neighbours. He gives them two examples from the Old Testament of foreigners who were helped while people from Israel, though also in need, apparently received no help. The message is clear to the people of Nazareth - expect no special favours just because he's from your home town! Even foreigners may receive help ahead of you! Is the gospel not a reminder that we do are all God's children whether we be Christians, Muslims, atheists or what have you? God loves everyone and does not play favourites!

I think the gospel is also a reminder that **we do not earn miracles** by our prayers. We can place our hopes and dreams before God, but we need to remember that we may need to let "God be God". The one who made the universe is in charge! Sometimes miracles do happen, though. Sometimes God wishes to partner with us to bring about something good. Never stop praying! The biggest miracle through some of our prayers may be a change in those of us who are praying. Or God may answer our prayers in a way we are not expecting. Prayer changes things, it's just that the changes are not always obvious to us.

The last few words that I have to say about miracles are said to have come from Jesus, himself. Before the Rwandan genocide Jesus is said to have appeared to a young man by the name of Segatashya. Segatashya was killed in the genocide. Segatashya said that Jesus indicated to him that people don't usually realize it but miracles are happening all around them. Our very lives are miracles!

'A true miracle is a child in the womb: a mother's love is a miracle; a forgiving heart is a miracle. Your lives are filled with miracles, but you are too distracted by material things to see them.' (Quote from 'The Boy who Met Jesus' page 32)

FAMILY ACTIVIY

"Happy-Mad Faces" Game



This gospel reading falls on the heels of last week's. Jesus told the synagogue audience a prophecy in Isaiah was fulfilled. Now the audience reacted. Who was this traveling preacher? Wasn't he the son of a carpenter? (This was a "put down" since carpenters were really semiskilled day laborers.) The skepticism grew to the point the audience grew into an angry mob ready to kill Jesus.

Luke's gospel points out an obvious fact: some will believe, others will not. Those who believe will be happy. Those who do not will be angry. Emphasize this point with the "Happy-Mad Face" game. Draw happy and mad faces on paper plates. Read Luke 4:15-30. As you read have your family hold up the happy face when Jesus talks. Have them hold up a mad face when the crowd reacts to his words. At the end of the reading, ask your family if they want to throw away the happy face of Jesus, like the crowd did when they tried to kill him. Or, would they like to throw away the mad face of the crowd? (Throw away the plates with the mad faces and hold up the happy faces.) End the game with prayer where your family accepts Jesus and his word.



Developing the Strength of a Prophet



The consoling words from the prophet Jeremiah give comfort to all of us. God told him that he, like each of us, was known even in his mother's womb. It was the knowledge of being known and loved that gave Jeremiah the strength to stand before his people and prophesy some very strong and harsh words. He was set as a strong pillar, a wall of brass, a fortified city. He was rooted in love, because he needed to be so as not to be crushed by the anger and resentment stirred up by his prophetic words.

Jesus faces the same ire when visiting his hometown. At first the Nazarenes praise him, but soon, as if they had some entitlement, they presumptuously demand that he perform miracles to satisfy their vanity—not to change their hearts. When Jesus challenges them, their response is to want to throw him off a cliff!

As Christians, we all have a prophetic mission. We're called to preach the truths of the gospel, and at times this isn't popular. In the public square, the Church and Christians are often praised for their charitable work but asked to silence their religious voice when morality is discussed. We need the strength and conviction of prophets as well as the love that drives them.

Catechism Themes: Praying at Difficult Times (CCC 2752-2758)

Expectations can be caused by frustration. We want something to happen. So we look to others for fulfillment. Faith can become confused. And prayer can dry up.

Why does prayer sometimes seem so hard? Prayer is sometimes difficult because we fight against ourselves and the temptations around us (including the devil). Prayer can become hard when we use prayer for selfish ends (praying only for a particular need or to reduce stress), or when we don't take the time to pray on a regular basis, or when we reject prayer as a "waste of time." Prayer can be extremely hard when we sense personal failure; we have the temptation to give up instead of persevering. As a result, we can feel dry and can be easily distracted in prayer; we can even lose faith and become depressed. (2752, 2753, 2754, 2755)

What can we do when prayer becomes hard? We can take two strategies when prayer becomes hard. First, we can realize that our faith is being tested; we can change our prayer in order to seek God's will for us. Second, we can realize that prayer is never wasted; we are challenged to use prayer as a means to overcome frustration in prayer. As St. Paul said, "Pray constantly." (1 Thess. 5:17) (2756, 2757)

How did Jesus pray in his time of difficulty? In John 17, Jesus prayed a prayer for his disciples called the "priestly prayer." Even before his death, he prayed for the unity of his followers and for union with his followers. His prayer teaches us the true measure of prayer, the desire to be one with God at every point in life. (2758)

What do you expect from prayer? How have your expectations been fulfilled? How has your prayer life helped (or hindered) your faith life?

Expectations are always hard to fulfill. But, faith is not based upon expectations, but on a relationship with God. We must recognize the difference between the two. And place our expectations before God. (Not the other way around!)

Make a list of expectations you have of others, especially of the Church and its leaders? Take a moment and place those expectations before God. Do this for the next week. Then review your list. How have your expectations changed?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
