INSTRUCTIONS FOR ATTENDING MASS

- Pre-registration for Saturday/Sunday Mass is required. Online at <u>www.stgerard.ca</u> Monday morning to Thursday at 12 noon.
- Maximum 30 people may attend Mass.
- Each household must register separately.
- Masks are mandatory. This includes from the time you leave your vehicle until you return to your vehicle after Mass.
- Members of the same household may sit together at the marked seating.
- At least two-metres separation is required between households at all times, <u>even with masks</u> <u>on</u>. **Please arrive early**.
- The following must stay home for the sake of the wider community:
 - People with COVID-19 symptoms, who live with someone with COVID-19, or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19
 - The sick, including those with a fever, cough, sore throat, runny nose, shortness of breath
 - Those who have travelled outside of the province or Canada within the last 14 days

A Note from Your Pastor.....

My dear Sisters and Brothers,

We are still in the Christmas season, which means we continue to celebrate that God became man. Celebrating the birth of our Savior with great joy in one day is not enough, therefore we continue to celebrate it after Christmas Day. The eight days following Christmas Day is called the Octave of Christmas. And after the Octave of Christmas we continue to celebrate the season, ending with the Baptism of the Lord a week after Epiphany. Indeed, Christmas is a time of rejoicing, rejoicing over the presence of God in Jesus Christ, rejoicing that we are no longer alone.



This weekend we celebrate The Epiphany, which means an "appearance" or "sign", especially of the divine. It also means a sudden and striking discovery.

We see both of these meanings in the Gospel today. First of all, Jesus is revealed to the three wise men. They come from far away and represent the non-Jewish world, which is also longing for a savior. The wise men search for Christ, and as they find God, to their great joy, they see the Epiphany, the sign of God. They worship him and offer him their gifts.

But there is another meaning of the word "Epiphany". It is a sudden and striking discovery. The wise men see God. Yet, was this how they expect to see him?

And here the wise men find a baby and his parents. God, the all-powerful, the creator of heaven and earth, chooses to come in the form of an innocent and precious infant.

I invite you to think about this: God's glory is a hidden glory in an infant. When the angels appear to the shepherds to tell them about the birth of the Savior, they say: "Glory to God in the highest." The wise men truly see that glory. They have their own epiphany. And therefore the true epiphany is that God's glory is a hidden glory. To me, this is the sudden and striking discovery.

I would say that God has many 'epiphanies' for us too. He will show us his glory, and it will often be hidden.

In our own lives, how can we come to recognize the ways God manifests himself? How can we come to understand and accept that God's glory is a hidden glory? It is certainly worth it. This brings us so much peace.

If we want to discover Him and see his Epiphany, we need to pay attention. As we take time to slow down, we start to become more aware that God is present and active in everything that happens at every moment. We start to recognize Christ's continuing epiphany in the events of our lives. We also start to recognize Christ manifesting himself to us in those around us, and in our relationships with them.

Here is something I plan to do this week:

- ✓ I will take time in my day to stop and reflect on what God is doing in my life. I will take time to slow down and to enjoy my life in every moment.
- ✓ Every day during this week I will spend 10 to 15 minutes in silence and prayer. I will not do anything except be present with and present to God.

I share with you my plan, and how about you? Would you like to do as I am planning to do?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA)

is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church.

Although the RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized, at St. Gerard we also prepare adults for the Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians (including Catholics) into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church.

If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated.

Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission. Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.

In Vincent Malo's painting, The Adoration of the Magi, a mysterious scene barely comes to light before us. Are we inside or outside of a Roman portico? What is going on in the background? The central scene clearly shows the Child Jesus perched in the Virgin's arms and surrounded by swaddling clothes. A glow emanates from the Child that enlightens the three Wise Men processing toward Jesus. Their whole caravan chaotically crowds around and strains to see the king they have come to worship.

A dalmatian wanders behind while a camel appears in the backlighting with a knowing smirk. The Ethiopian sage sympathetically stares out from the center of the painting and seemingly asks us if we understand the significance of their travels.

The arrival of these astronomers from the East sends a very important message for all of us at Mass today. Jesus is the light of the whole world, and all peoples—no matter how far or how lost are invited by his attractive and saving light. This light came to the Chosen People and will be fully consumed in Jerusalem as Isaiah prophesies. Yet he will proclaim that all peoples are invited to be members of the same family and coheirs to the treasures of God's love and mercy. Faith in him and acceptance of his gospel truth is all he asks. So, no matter how far you or anyone you know seems from Jesus and his truth, he loves them and wants them around his table to experience his love.

YOUTH REFLECTION

"Following the Star"

This Week...

Isaiah foretold that nations would gather to follow the light and offer gifts. The story of the Magi has glamour, danger, and courage. It is a story of accepting the journey to an unknown place; following the start because of faith. And it is a story of Gentiles coming to visit Jews, bringing gifts, and being welcomed.

For Your Reflection

The astrologers in the Magi story went through quite a journey in search of the baby Jesus. They obviously believed in him and had faith in the star.

- Have you ever "followed a star"? Have you ever gone after a dream or an ideal you believed in? Are you still going after it? What gives you the energy to keep going? How do you know it is worth it?

The gifts brought by the Magi have significance. *Gold* is a symbol of wealth and fidelity. *Frankincense* is burned to purify the atmosphere by releasing an aromatic and pleasing smell. For centuries, Native Americans have burned holy smoke in order to bless and purify themselves, and monks have watched incense rise to the sky as a symbol of their prayers ascending to God. *Myrrh* is a kind of resin or oil used for anointing and embalming. It is a symbol of comfort and soothing (who doesn't enjoy a rubdown?) but it is also foreshadowing of death.
