#### A Note from Your Pastor ....

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Last weekend we heard how the Lord prepared the prophet Ezekiel for a tough mission: "I am sending you to the children of Israel, to a nation of rebels who have rebelled against me". And although people would reject the message, the Lord never stopped sending messengers to them so "they shall know that there has been a Prophet among them".

Continuing from what we heard last week, in the first reading this weekend we see a true prophet, Amos, chosen and sent by God, totally rejected by God's people. We could think that as a prophet of God, everyone would simply hear and obey him. But the message wasn't comfortable for them, and so they rejected it, and they sent him away.

Similar to this, in the Gospel for this weekend, Jesus is giving some instructions to his apostles. Jesus is also preparing them for rejection, for he knows that the fallen human nature doesn't like to be pushed outside of its comfort zone: "If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them".

Today we are invited to reflect on how well we listen to God's word. Are we choosing what we like to hear? Do we really want to hear what we want or what we have to hear? Are we rejecting, denying God's words because they are so strong and require a true conversion of heart?

I ask you to ask yourself this important question: Is my heart like the "place" that Jesus mentions in the Gospel? If we welcome God's word, his grace will come and stay, bringing peace, wisdom, and salvation. We can see it in the Responsorial Psalm: "Let me hear what God the Lord will speak, for he will speak peace to his people. Surely his salvation is at hand for those who fear him, that his glory may dwell in our land." (Ps 85)

God is well aware that faithful Christians will not always receive a warm welcome in this fallen world. But he calls us to be faithful anyway, to trust and to continue in what is right and good even when it is not popular. Listening to and following God's word can be uncomfortable sometimes, but we must resist the temptation to flee from it.

This week we can apply what we hear from the Gospel by sharing the Good News that God has shared with us with those around us. We don't have to make a big deal out of it; we just have to sincerely care about the people around us.

St. Augustine says: "Beware of the grace of God that passes by, never to return again". Therefore be attentive to listen to God's word because, according to Psalm 119.105, "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path."

I wish all of you a blessed weekend. Be happy for re-opening and welcoming things back to normal. However, be mindful that we need to be careful in order to protect ourselves and others from another outbreak. Please be aware that the Covid is not really disappearing.

#### **Our Tradition of Service**

Blessed Fra Angelico, a fifteenth-century Dominican brother, was also a famous painter—so much so that St. John Paul II made him the patron of painters. His chapel for Pope Nicholas V, dedicated to Deacon St. Lawrence, patron of Rome, still survives in the Vatican.

The emperor reportedly told St. Lawrence to show him the treasures of the Church, and so he brought the poor before the Roman emperor, saying that these are the Church's true treasures. Fra Angelico's wonderful 1449 fresco, St. Lawrence Giving Alms, shows Lawrence, who served in Rome in the third century, giving coins to the poor and lame of the city.

Indeed, for the Church, those most in need are those who most interest us, because they are the ones who most interested Christ. From the very beginning, Jesus sent out his apostles, two by two, to prepare people to receive his preaching. They were to heal the sick, cast out demons, and preach the gospel of salvation. He did not concentrate his efforts only on the influential, although he didn't avoid them, but rather invested his efforts in forming his apostles in preaching and service.

Christ has entrusted the Church with that same mission, and it continues to fulfill this charge worldwide. No continent or country is without the presence of the Catholic Church, with its missionaries and institutions who care for the materially, intellectually, and spiritually poor. We should be proud to be part of such a worldwide force for good that has served so many for so long.

#### "Sent Forth as Apostles"

#### This Week...

This is not easy work we have. We hear the word of God, we believe, and we receive the Holy Spirit. Now the hard part begins. Like Amos, we will be told sometimes to take our religion elsewhere. Like the Twelve, we have no plan and no idea of the future. When we find someone who wants to share our faith, we are to stick around. If not, we are to shake the dust and move on.

#### For Your Reflection

Jesus tells the Twelve to go out in pairs, so friendship must be important. Jesus doesn't want us to go it alone.

- Who are your closest friends?
- What do you like about your friends? What do they like about you?

Jesus tells the Twelve to stay where they are welcome, and to leave when they are not.

- Where do you feel welcome? Where is a place you feel safe and secure? Why is that?
- When have you not felt welcome? When have you had to just move on because things were not working out the way you had hoped?

Jesus tells the Twelve not to take any money or extra clothes. They have no plan and no map. They just have to take the risk, trust in their faith, and see what happens.

- How is that like your life? How is that unlike your life?

Jesus does tell them to take a walking stick - to support them as they journey.

 What gives you support? Do you have a hobby or an activity that gives your life structure and helps you to find meaning?

**RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA)** is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

**Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church.** If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
