In Touch with the Word

July 16/17 *Martha and Mary*

Scripture:

•Genesis 18.1-10

God appeared to Abraham as three visitors, and Abraham showed them fine hospitality. Abraham was told that his wife, Sarah, would give birth to a son.

•Colossians 1.24-28

Paul speaks of his joy (despite his suffering) of being a minister to the church.

°Luke 10.38-42

Jesus visits Martha and Mary. Martha is tending to the household needs of hospitality while Mary sits and listens to Jesus.

Theme:

Hospitality is very important. Abraham is hospitable to three strangers, and then receives the marvellous news that he will have a son with his wife, Sarah. Jesus visits Martha and Mary and, in their different ways, they both attend to the needs of hospitality. Good and effective ministry, which Paul speaks of, involves the element of hospitality.

Reflection:

Mary and Martha are both attending to hospitality. Martha runs around preparing food and getting cups and bowls ready. Mary puts all her energy into listening to what Jesus has to say. Martha is anxious about making things perfect for Jesus, but Jesus tells her that what Mary has chosen to do at that time is very important.

- Have you ever hosted a large party for friends or family? Have you ever found yourself so busy with the tasks of cooking, serving, and other preparations that you hardly had any time at all to take to your guests?
- What is that feeling like? Does that feel like a successful party, or do you feel like the whole event was ruined by your busyness and level of activity?
- Do you think Jesus is trying to tell us that keeping our house clean and having food available to offer to guests is not important? What do you think is his main message?
- When you go to someone's home to visit, what is more important to you: that the placemats and napkins match the flowers in the centerpiece, or that the person you are visiting is paying attention to you, listening to you, and enjoying your company?

July 23/24 Ask and You Will Receive

Scripture:

•Genesis 18.20-32

Abraham asks the Lord for mercy for the sake of the innocent and receives it.

•Colossians 2.12-14

Because of our faith we have new life, and all our sins are pardoned.

•Luke 11.1-13

Jesus teaches us to pray and assures us that our prayers will be answered if we ask, seek, and knock.

Theme:

Faith in prayer is stressed in these readings. Abraham is persistent, and he manages to persuade the Lord to not destroy the cities for the sake of even ten innocent people. Paul tells us that our faith is what will raise us to new life. Jesus is observed praying and, in response to his disciples' request, teaches them how to pray, emphasizing persistence.

Reflection:

Jesus uses loving parents and their responses to their children as an image to understand the relationship between God and us. We would not give our children snakes and scorpions if they needed fish or eggs. So, too, God will give us what we need.

- If you are a parent, what do your children ask you for? Do they always need the things they ask for? What is your response if they ask for things that they don't need (or should not have)?
- If you are not a parent, what do you imagine you would do in that situation if you were a parent?

Jesus teaches us to pray: "Subject us not to the trial." We pray to not be led to temptation, but often we have a choice. Sometimes we lead ourselves to temptation, knowing full well what we are doing.

• What are your temptations? How do you stay away from them?

Bringing Jesus Into Our Work and Prayer

Jesus enjoyed resting in the home of his friends Lazarus, Martha, and Mary because of their affection and hospitality. Martha was a big part of this hospitality because she was energetic and dedicated to making sure Jesus was cared for. Mary also made him feel at home as she was hungry for the Lord's teaching. She was open, interested, and attentive.

Yet on this occasion Martha is overcome with the urgent and leaves aside the important. Martha receives Christ in her home while Mary brings him into her heart. Living in relationship with Jesus always includes these two elements. Part of our love for him involves sitting at his feet in prayer. This is no doubt the "better part." Yet, serving Jesus also requires an active, busy life of work and responsibilities. Far from being an obstacle, work should be an occasion for a closer relationship with Jesus.

The key is having a unifying center to life; that center should be Jesus. He is the "why" we do what we do—whether work, play, or pray. Martha wasn't mistaken in serving Jesus' needs, but she lost focus with anxiety and worries. How to maintain this focus? First, pray regularly to remain centered. Second, don't sweat the small stuff at work or home. Third, frequently redirect your intention with a short, motivating motto like "All for you my Jesus" or "Your kingdom come!" Find one that works for you.

Let's not lose sight of the Lord of our work when doing the work of the Lord.

Blessing's Ultimate Form

What is a blessing? I've heard people use the phrase "God bless you" in a manner

similar to the way they say, "Have a nice day." At other times, people ask for a blessing as if they are asking a favour from God. Finally, some people ask for a Bible to be blessed or for a special blessing immediately after receiving the Eucharist. And while we should desire blessings, the act of blessing has a much fuller meaning than many of us realize.

An essential element of worship is prayer. The four traditional types of prayer are blessing and adoration, thanksgiving, petition, and intercession. Therefore, at a deeper level, a blessing is a particular manner of worship. It stems from a profound adoration that is expressed through a desire to be more like the beloved. For example, sometimes a young child will act like a parent because the child wants to be similar to the parent. This is an outward expression of an internal disposition of respect, admiration, and love.

By definition, a blessing is the act of sanctifying someone or something. When someone or something is sanctified, it has become holy, and to be holy means to be set aside for the purposes of God. The person or object is brought into the presence of God, or we might say, "brought closer to God." This is not to say God isn't everywhere; rather, the blessing is our acknowledgment that this person or object belongs to God and that it is God who determines the right order, purpose, and design of all.

Thus, the blessed object or person is to be in conformity with the will of God. For example, if a person wants a car blessed, the car now exists to do the will of God, not merely the will of the person. This car now must be used in the service of God.

At the level of blessing, we are expressing the desire to be more like God. Through the blessing, we give our free will to God and allow God to be Lord of our lives. We are saying, "Lord, you are Lord of all, make me holy as you are holy, to do your will in all things, all places, and all times, so that I may be more like you."

For a Catholic, this statement finds no fuller meaning than in the blessing that comes when we receive the Eucharist—the Real Presence of Christ. When we give our lives as a gift to God, it is the ultimate form of blessing. And through the action of the Holy Spirit, God gives us his divine life through the gift of his Son.

- Is there anyone who has done you wrong whom you cannot forgive? What gets in the way of your forgiveness?
- If all our sins are forgiven anyway, why should we even try to resist temptation? Why not just continue to sin if we can always be forgive? What would Jesus say to that proposition?

If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.

OFFERING A MASS

The offering of a Mass in the name of a deceased family member or friend is one of the greatest ways to keep our beloved dead in our living memory. At each celebration of the Mass, the great prayer of sacrifice is made complete as Jesus' life, death and resurrection is offered to God the Father. When we offer a Mass for a particular person, we ask that in a special way the individual be remembered by the priest who offers up the great sacrifice on behalf of the whole community of faith. In a very real and active way, the life, death and resurrection of the person remembered becomes present and is offered up with Jesus. Each time we offer up a Mass for someone, living or dead, we celebrate the greatest gift of our faith – the gift of Everlasting Life in Christ.
