INSTRUCTIONS FOR ATTENDING MASS

- <u>EACH HOUSEHOLD</u> must pre-register separately for Saturday/Sunday Mass. Online at <u>www.stgerard.ca</u> beginning Monday morning until all seats are reserved or until Thursday at 12 noon (whichever comes first)
- Max. 100 (approx.) people may attend Mass
- Members of the same household may sit together at the marked seating
- Two-metres separation is required between households <u>at all times</u>, <u>even with masks on</u>.
- Please arrive early.
- The following must stay home for the sake of the wider community:
- People with COVID-19 symptoms, who live with someone with COVID-19, or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19
- Those who have travelled to/from a "hotspot", inside/outside of Saskatchewan or outside Canada within the last 14 days
- Those who are waiting for COVID-19 test results, or have someone in their household waiting for test results

A Note from Your Pastor

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

This weekend we celebrate the Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time. The readings remind us that the Lord has already sown the Kingdom of God in us and the seeds continue to grow because "... *the seed would sprout and grow without his knowing how*". I would say that the Kingdom of God grows in us due to God's power, and it can grow stronger, too, if we cultivate the seeds and live with God's grace in our hearts.

As we hear in the first reading, Ezekiel describes the Messiah as a tender shoot taken off the main tree, which represents the royal stock of David. The tender shoot will grow, and the Messiah will be established. It will grow to be the tallest tree, and it will provide shelter for all those who can reach those heights.

In the second reading St. Paul reminds us that the way we live will determine how our dying, mortal selves will grow in eternity. Year after year our mortal bodies grow old and slowly die whether we like it or not. Our eternal life, however, will live forever and depends on how we act in our earthly life.

We are reminded that the seed of eternal life is sown in us through Baptism. We can "nurture" and "water" it with God's grace, or we can neglect it and focus so much on pleasing a dying, earthly body that our eternal life is at risk. The Lord wants our earthly life to flourish and blossom into something wonderful and, for sure, he wants the same for our eternal life as well.

We recall that when Jesus begins his public ministry the core of his message is that "*the Kingdom of God is at hand*". He asked his followers for a true conversion and faith in the Gospel as he said "*repent and believe in the Gospel*". And therefore, as we hear in the Gospel today, he uses parables to help us to understand what the Kingdom of God is: the sowing and reaping of grain and the growth of a mustard seed. By using parables, he explains, using everyday language, the deeper spiritual realities so that we may understand a huge mystery: The Kingdom of God.

Indeed, the Kingdom of God reflects this insight: it is reflected in the Church, but it is also the entire work of salvation.

The parable of the grain shows us that grain requires cultivation and waiting for the right time to reap the spiritual harvest, but it also shows that God does the heavy lifting. The growth is quiet, slow, and unseen, even when we are not doing anything. All comes from Him as His grace is working in our souls.

The example of the mustard seed shows that even though it starts small it will be great. We can see this in Jesus when he started with a small group - the group of twelve. This "tiny seed" led to an explosion of Christianity, reaching out to the whole world. It is God who brings about His kingdom, and He invites us to join with Him in building it here on earth until it reaches perfection and fullness in heaven.

My dear sisters and brothers, think about this:

The Kingdom of God is sown in our hearts and cultivated by God's grace: it grows and spreads to the degree that holiness grows and spreads. You and I, we are all called to continue to have faith in the Gospel and exercise it in our daily life. We can be open to God's grace by changing the way we live.

Today if I want to change the world, I will start by being holy. The Lord will lead me from there. How about you?

Spreading Seeds By Fr. Mark Haydu, LC

The kingdom of God has an inward power, an effervescence with which it is equipped, that makes it a force of growth and multiplication. Jesus compares the kingdom with a seed. You plant it in favorable soil and, you know not how, it springs up into a little plant and then eventually into a full-grown tree. Its life principle is not given by the soil—although that helps it grow—but rather it has power of itself to expand.

The Christian life and the kingdom are very much like this. At baptism we have received supernatural grace in our souls. And if given suitable support, that faith will grow and become the transformative element of our lives. It will drive us toward a life of faith, hope, and love. It will lead us to forgive others, improve society, and transform everything for good.

The same can be said of the Church, Christ's kingdom of love. Christ planted the seed of faith in his apostles and that seed spread and thrived all across Europe. Their faith multiplied and grew until all throughout the world the fruits of their faith are on display as a veritable kingdom of charity: hospitals, universities, soup kitchens, hospices, shelters for the battered and homeless, retreat centers, chapels, churches, museums, research and rehabilitation centers, religious orders, lay associations, volunteer groups, and the list could and does continue on and on. There is a force in faith and love that cannot be contained!

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STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION

The principle of the universal destination of goods, found in Catholic Social Teaching, reminds us that the gifts of the earth are to serve the needs of all and not just the few. Pope Francis recalls the words of Pope Saint John Paul II: "God gave the earth to the whole human race for the sustenance of all its members, without excluding or favouring anyone" (LS, no. 93, emphasis in original). We have a solemn duty to ensure that the earth's goods are equitably shared by all.

YOUTH REFLECTION

"From the Tiniest Seed"

This Week...

Seeds are such tiny and unassuming things - who would imagine the power and force they can release as they grow and become something huge and magnificent. How it happens is a mystery - even to the farmers who plant them and nurture them. They sow by faith, not by sight, believing that somehow the miracle will happen again and they will have a crop. Ezekiel tells us how Yahweh will bring new life to the lifeless and will wither the life that is growing badly. Jesus tells us that the Reign of God is as mysterious as the seed that grows, and as surprisingly powerful as the tiniest seed that becomes the biggest shrub.

For Your Reflection

Jesus tells us that a tiny seed can blossom into a huge growth.

- What is a tiny interest of hobby you may have started a long time ago as a "seed" that has now grown into a big, important part of your life?

- Who is a person that started out as just an acquaintance of yours but whose relationship with you has now grown into an important and very close friendship?

In the early church, the Christians are recognized right away as honest, selfless, generous, loving, forgiving people. People can tell they are Christians just by the way they live, and it is so inspiring that people want to join their faith community and be just like them. Christians didn't have to carry signs or wear T-shirts to advertise themselves; people just knew how wonderful they were.

- Is it easy to tell who's a Christian today? Can you observe someone's behaviour and know whether they are a follower of Jesus? Why or why not?

- Some very violent behaviour is happening in the world today in the name of God and religion. Can you think of any examples? Some very helpful, peaceful behaviours is also happening today that has nothing to do with formal religion. Can you think of any examples? How do these trends affect the way many young people view religion? How do these trends affect the way you yourself view the church?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
