# THE SOLEMNITY OF THE NATIVITY OF SAINT JOHN THE BAPTIST

Holy Mass will be celebrated Monday, June 24 at 7pm

#### A Real Force of Nature

One of the forces of nature that we have been unable to control is unruly water. We are actually helpless when caught between torrents of rain from above and surging water from below. It is no wonder the ancestors of ancient Israel who lived Tigris and Euphrates between the rivers characterized cosmic evil as tumultuous water that only the great Creator-God could control. This is the scene described in the reading from Job. This water is not destroyed; it is only harnessed. We will have to wait for the end of time for such water to be abolished. ("The sea was no more" Revelation 21:1.) This divine power over water is praised in the psalm response as well.

Belief in God's absolute power over chaotic water and cosmic evil lies behind the story of Jesus calming the sea. This story doesn't simply recount a display of Jesus' extraordinary command over the forces of nature. While certainly that, it is actually much more. It stands to reason that, if only the great Creator-God can exercise control over this fearsome watery threat, and if Jesus can effortlessly exercise control over such water. then Jesus is somehow God. In today's Gospel, the audacious disciples, who initially were frightened by the ferocity of the squall, were astounded by Jesus' authority over the storm. They declared, "Who then is this whom even wind and sea obey?" (Mark 4:41). It is clear from this story that Jesus is the real force of nature.

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What calms the storm in life is not that all of our problems suddenly disappear but that, within them, we realize that, because God is still in charge, all will be well - whiplash, bruises, ransacked houses,



alcoholic spouses, lost houses, lost jobs, loneliness, and the shadow of death itself notwithstanding.

All will be well because, even asleep with his head on a cushion, God is still lord.

# YOUTH CONNECTION FOR THE TWELFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



Trusting in God's Power The readings for the 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B show us God's power and our need to trust Him. In the first reading, God reminds Job of His control over the sea. He set boundaries for the waters and commands the waves.

This shows God's authority over creation. Even the mighty sea, which can be so powerful and frightening, obeys God's commands. We can trust that God is in control of everything in our lives too.

In the Gospel, we see Jesus calming the storm. The disciples are afraid, but Jesus shows His power over the wind and sea. He asks them why they are afraid and questions their faith.

Finding Peace in Christ When we face storms in our own lives, we can remember Jesus' power. Just as He calmed the sea for the disciples, He can bring peace to our troubled hearts. We only need to trust Him and have faith.

Paul's letter to the Corinthians tells us that Christ's love changes us. We no longer live for ourselves, but for Him. In Christ, we become new creations, leaving our old ways behind. This new life in Christ is full of hope and promise. When we trust in His love, we can face any storm with courage. We know that He is with us, guiding and protecting us.

Living as New Creations Being a new creation in Christ means living differently. It means turning away from sin and selfishness. It means loving others as Christ loves us.

We are reminded to trust in God's power and live for Christ. This is a call to deeper faith and a stronger commitment to following Jesus.

The disciples' fear during the storm teaches us about our own fears. We often feel overwhelmed by life's challenges. But Jesus shows us that He is greater than any storm.

Turning to God in Prayer When we feel afraid or lost, we can turn to God in prayer. Just as the disciples cried out to Jesus, we can cry out to Him too. He hears us and will help us. Jesus is always with us, even in the stormiest moments. He is our peace and our strength. By trusting in Him, we find the courage to face any challenge.

### FAMILY CONNECTION FOR THE TWELFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Gospel Reading Mark 4.35-41 Jesus calms the storm.

Worries and concerns are part of human life. Jesus teaches us, however, that we ought not to let worries and concerns consume us. Jesus teaches us that our faith ought to lead us to trust in God's protection and love, no matter how strong the whirlwind going on around us. Like the disciples, we can bring our worries and concerns to Jesus in prayer. Jesus will hear our cries for help. He knows that our faith can be fragile and he will act so that our trust in God will be strengthened. As you gather as a family, invite each family member to talk about something that might be worrying them. Talk about how important it is to share worries and concerns with other people. When we do this, we learn to see our worries from a different perspective. Read today's Gospel, Mark 4:35-41. Ask your family questions such as these: Why were the disciples worried about the storm? Why wasn't Jesus worried about the storm? When we bring our worries to Jesus in prayer, Jesus can help us see things from God's perspective. Invite family members to name again a worry or concern and pray together that Jesus will help us have faith in God's love and protection. Conclude in prayer together by praying the Lord's Prayer.
