INSTRUCTIONS FOR ATTENDING MASS

Thank you for continuing to register in advance!

- <u>EACH HOUSEHOLD</u> must pre-register separately for Saturday/Sunday Mass. Online at www.stgerard.ca beginning Monday morning until all seats are reserved or until Thursday at 12 noon (whichever comes first)
- Max. 100 (approx.) people may attend Mass
- Members of the same household may sit together at the marked seating
- Two-metres separation is required between households at all times, even with masks on.
- Please arrive early.
- The following must stay home for the sake of the wider community:
- People with COVID-19 symptoms, who live with someone with COVID-19, or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19
- Those who have travelled to/from a "hotspot", inside/outside of Saskatchewan or outside Canada within the last 14 days
- Those who are waiting for COVID-19 test results, or have someone in their household waiting for test results

A Note from Your Pastor

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

This weekend we hear a beautiful story in the Gospel. It begins with a simple request for healing but then a great thing happens after. Not only is there healing but life came back from death. Similar to the Gospel last week, we see that Jesus has acquired a miraculous power, the power to heal, the power over death, the power over all.

As we hear in the Gospel, Jairus, the synagogue official, was a humble man. He acknowledges that to save his daughter, he needs something beyond his own powers. And that is clearly verified by how he approaches Jesus.

Mark tells us that Jairus "fell at Jesus' feet and begged him repeatedly". We should know that as a synagogue official he is in a high position of the society and is a well-known person in the city. It is not easy for him to fall at someone's feet or beg for anything.

Faced with the human sickness of his daughter, Jairus is humbled when he acknowledges that there is a higher power than him in the universe, and he humbles himself before the Lord when he offers his request. The Lord accepts his request, and sets out for the house of Jairus.

However, while they were on their way, they receive the sad news that the girl has died. The messengers suggest that they should stop coming. They suggest that Jairus should not bother Jesus anymore. It helps us to see that they were hopeless.

However, Jesus ignores the words of the messengers. His sense of hope is totally opposite with those around him at that moment. He asks Jairus to remain in faith, "*Do not fear, only believe*". With these words, Jesus and his companions continue the journey and great thing happens at Jairus' house.

My dear sisters and brothers, I wonder what can we learn from the Gospel this weekend? Here are some points I would like to share with you:

We need to learn to be as humble as Jairus. Although Jairus is a synagogue official with a high position, he becomes humble in front of Jesus. It is what we hear in Luke 1.48: "for he (God) looked with favour on the lowliness of his servant". God loves the humble ones. We need to acknowledge that we must rely on him.

"Do not fear, only believe". Jesus encourages Jairus with these words. He encourages Jairus to keep his faith alive. I have a feeling that Jesus is saying to each of us the same thing: "Do not fear, only believe". With faith all things can be fixed, changed to be better.

We have been in a difficult time with the global pandemic. It has changed all things, and now when we look back on the past eighteen months, we would say that sometimes we have had doubt, we may have lost hope, and we may have lost faith. Jesus is encouraging us "Do not fear, only believe".

Finally, I would like to invite you to renew your faith in Jesus. If we have faith, we will have trust, if we have trust we gain hope and if we have faith, trust and hope, we have all things.


PRAYER FOR CANADA DAY

Accepting Pain

Michelangelo's statue The Pietà, finished before he turned twenty-four, expresses a theme Italians didn't eniov seeina in art: death. Even worse, it recalls the torturous death of a crucified son held by his mourning mother. The image is horrific.

In his approach, Michelangelo is revolutionary. Rather than directly representing death, his statue is a meditation on it. Instead of showing the Virgin in the moment of extreme anguish, the normal strategy to achieve pity in the onlooker, the master decides to show Mary in humble acceptance of this heart-wrenching moment.

She doesn't fight or run from the pain in rebellious screams. Her teeth aren't clenched, her brow is unwrinkled, and her eves aren't filled with tears imploring upward seeking to understand the illogical. She merely sits in the painful moment embracing the Son and abandoning her sorrow to the Father who permitted it.

Her hands reveal her attitude. One holds her Son under his arm firmly. She pulls him to her, sustaining the weight of the mystery. She absorbs the moment, fleeing not. Remaining in the pain, she endures the cost of our redemption, expressing her fiat again, in silence: Let it be done to me according to your word.

The other hand tilts toward us, open. She is letting go, giving over! She knows this Child in her arms was never only hers, but everyone's. We're invited to grasp her open hand, join her pain, and do our part to take up our own cross and follow him.

YOUTH REFLECTION

"Daring to Touch Jesus"

This Week...

The Book of Wisdom proclaims that our God is a God of living; Paul reminds us that our call is to be generous to those who suffer. In Mark's Gospel Jesus demonstrates both principles. He raises a little girl from the dead and he praises a woman for being brave and faithful enough to reach out and grab for the garment she believes will cure her.

For Your Reflection

This woman who struggles to touch Jesus' robe is in a desperate situation. The Gospel tells us that she has been bleeding for twelve years. That's hard to imagine. IN those days any woman who was bleeding was seen as unclean until her period of bleeding was over. So not only does she touch Jesus' robe and receive power without asking for it (she steals something that belongs to someone else), but she is in fact unclean (and thus causing all of them to risk being made unclean). She should have been reprimanded, but Jesus praises her.

- What does Jesus' praise of this woman say about his view of the cultural practice of keeping the "unclean" women away from other "clean" people?
- Besides curing this woman's medical condition, how else does Jesus heal her and restore her dignity?
- As men in a society that views women as people who become unclean every month, Jesus' disciples must have had a hard time with this. What do you suppose they were thinking, and how do you think Jesus' actions challenged their attitudes toward women?

When Jesus goes in to see Jairus's daughter, he lets only Peter, James, and John go in with him. The rest of the followers have to stay outside. Jesus did this a lot; Peter, James, and John get to do lots of things that the others aren't invited to do.

- How do you think the other disciples reacted to this?
- Why do you think Jesus would behave in such a way having favourites?
- Do you think Peter, James, and John kept it a secret from the other Apostles that Jesus had raised the little girl from the dead, or do you think they told the others? Do you think the young girl's family members kept it a secret, or do you think they told people about it? Why?



RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.

Each time we offer up a Mass for someone, living or dead, we celebrate the greatest gift of our faith – the gift of Everlasting Life in Christ.
