#### A Note from Your Pastor ....

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

We celebrate the second Sunday of Lent. In the Gospel we hear the story of Jesus revealing his true divine to his disciples. We wonder what the true meaning of this event is. Most of us are unaware of the spiritual meaning of this story. In our reflection for this weekend, I would like to invite you all to look a little deeper at what the transfiguration means.

The first thing we need to know is that the transfiguration of Jesus is a vision of Peter, James and John. We know this is a vision as Jesus told them not to tell it to anyone until the Son of Man is risen from the dead. In the Gospel for this weekend we hear: "*The disciples kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.*"

Second, we see that this is a sign of the difference between the two covenants. It is the ending of one (Old Testament) and the beginning of another (New Testament). The story symbolizes the end of the law and the prophets. God the Father claims that "*This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him.*" Indeed, Jesus, he himself, is a high priest of the new covenant and where there is a new high priest it is required that there be a new law. The old law ended and now God is no longer speaking through the prophets but through His Son.

Third, this is a good chance for the disciples to discover who Jesus is. Before this event, Peter, on behalf of others, had confessed that Jesus was the Messiah but he had no idea of what that meant. It was very clear that when Jesus spoke of His death, it confused Peter. Therefore, the transfiguration helped Peter and others to confirm what they confessed. It shows Peter, James, and John that Jesus is neither an ordinary man or even a great prophet, but that he is indeed the Messiah, the Son of God.

And one more, the last thing: this event is the key to understanding the passion of Jesus and his commitment to it. Jesus wants his disciples to know that he would be glorified but it would not at all be the kind of glory that humans would expect. The transfiguration is meant to be a lesson of the passion. It would only be through his death and resurrection that he would attain that glory. That is why Jesus committed himself to the cross. For him, it is the path to glory.

In this story, the appearance of Jesus' face is a very special one, but it is not his only face. He has all the faces that we have: anger, gentleness, compassion, sadness, fear, anguish. Behind all of these, he also carries within him the splendor of divinity, as the Father said, "*This is my beloved Son*."

We learn that the human face is very important. To remember someone is to remember his/her face. The face always reveals who we are and the life we are having. In other words, we can read what people are feeling inside, how they really are, whether they are sad or happy, shocked or indifferent, all by the appearance of their face.

Each of us has many faces. At different times we wear the face of happiness or sadness, courage or defeat, peace or unrest, hope or despair, joy or pain, friendship or hostility. There is nothing to be ashamed of in all of this because it is a part of being human.

Today we are told that on the mountain Jesus' face shone like the sun. What we hear in the Gospel is real. It does reveal something of Jesus' inner glory that at other times was hidden from us.

Like Abraham, we are called to live by faith, the faith that assures us that behind the most ordinary human face lies a child of God, a brother and sister of Jesus, bound for eternal glory. Therefore, we are invited to show the face of faith in every moment of our life. We are also invited to show the "face of love" and the "face of faith" to one another in our actions and in words. That is what I believe that God's Word this weekend invites us to do.

Have a blessed weekend to you all and **PLEASE** pray for peace in Ukraine. Pray for the ending of war and, as Pope Francis has suggested, pray one "Hail Mary" each time you think of the tragedies in Ukraine.

# Madagascar: an ecological village to cope with climate change

Development and Peace's People and Planet First campaign celebrates what solidarity can achieve, even against seemingly impossible odds. In Madagascar, for instance, Development and Peace's partner, the Development Council of Andohatapenaka (CDA), empowers people to manage and transform their neighbourhoods. In the capital region, which is afflicted by flooding and poor waste management, CDA has helped the residents of one vulnerable area to turn their environs into a thriving ecological village. Today, each of the 50 households involved in the project has a vegetable garden, a stove and solar panels. This transformation reflects a true ecological conversion.

## An Unexpected Awakening

I'm not sure what I expected, but as I crossed the threshold, the room with its cement floor, cinder-block walls, and two small windows placed near the ceiling caused me to question my sanity. What in the world was I doing here? In lieu of a bed, a hammock hung from the ceiling in one corner of the room, and in another was a straight-back chair facing a shelf-like table that held a wooden cross fashioned from tree branches. There was no electricity, but

there was running water, evidenced by the small sink and toilet tucked behind a half-wall that partially divided the space. This was my first trip to the hermitage hidden deep in the woods on the grounds of a Benedictine monastery. I had decided spending time in a hermitage would be a meaningful, delightful way to begin the season of Lent. Now I wasn't so sure.

But as I looked around the room, I realized the bare-bones environment was intentional. There was nothing pleasant to look at, nothing to distract me. I could no longer run from God or hide behind work or family commitments. With nothing else to do, I took a deep breath, closed my eyes, and let the world around me disappear.

A cocoon-like silence enveloped me, and as my heart began to swell, I knew I stood on holy ground. In the hours and days that followed, I discovered that it wasn't the hermitage I was visiting that was holy. It was the hermitage that God was building inside me that was pure, a place I could carry with me long after I left the monastery grounds. This unexpected awakening gave me a new perspective, which, in essence, is what Lent is all about.

The word *Lent* means "lengthening of days." It reminds us we have time to turn away from sin and fall in love with God. We begin by stripping away excuses for our sins and shortcomings. We strive to shed illusions rooted in the false self and enter the desert with Jesus, where we are given the opportunity to discover what can only be learned through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

Each year, the Church invites us to enter the desert, because once is never enough. Despite our best intentions, we grow weary, our resolve dissipates, and our baptismal robe becomes soiled. Hence, the penitential tone of Lent invites us to fast not only from food but also from sin and all that may lead us astray. We recognize that we can't do this by ourselves and so we profess our weakness and ask God to create a clean heart in us and renew our commitment to practice good works.

Lent is serious business, but serious is not the same as gloomy. In fact, Lent can be a time of joyful consolation because the more we empty ourselves, the more God fills us with his mercy and grace. This is the good news with which we are called to begin our Lenten journey, because, according to St. Paul in 2 Corinthians 6:2, God affirms, "In an acceptable time I heard you, and on the day of salvation I helped you."

**RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA)** is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

**Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church.** If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
