A Note from Your Pastor

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

There are many lessons in the Gospel for this weekend. It is a parable, and it is important for us to recognize that the father in this story represents God, the older son represents the Pharisee, and the young one represents sinners.

The parable is primarily about the younger son who abandons his father and squanders his life in extreme self-indulgence and sensuality. He wants to enjoy his freedom according to his own will. He often thinks that his father condemns his freedom, not allowing him to do whatever he wants. He believes that he does not have enough freedom and this always bothers him.

The younger son had looked for joy in all the wrong places because he got tired of living under his father's rule. He became self-centered, but that left him unfulfilled. Think about this as it is exactly what happens to us when we go looking for happiness in sin, in disobedience to God's will.

The older son also lost sight of his father's goodness. He let the routine of life embitter his heart. He forgot that his father was actually giving him everything. For all of us, sometimes, we do the same thing: on the outside we seem to be good Catholics, but on the inside we are angry and critical, because we're just going through the motions. We have let the fire go out of our friendship with Christ.

In the Gospel Jesus is giving us a portrait of God, who always takes the first step to bring us back into his friendship, no matter how far we may have strayed. This is also the story of the merciful father, because in a fallen world, mercy is God's main expression of love. That is the kind of joy in which the Gospel invites us to reflect and renew today.

Because God is all-knowing and loving, he knows us and loves us through and through as he pays attention to us. Just as the father does in this story, who does whatever he can for his two sons, God is always paying attention to us. He cannot stop thinking about each one of us.

Routine in our relationship with God is the obstacle to our experiencing Christian joy. Christian joy is precisely the thing that our heart hungers, because that is what it was made for - to be known and loved by God, through and through.

When we turn our attention to God, we see him paying attention to us, knowing and loving us, and that fills us with a joy that doesn't wear out.

Most of us don't always feel that joy. We have faith, and we believe God loves us. So why don't we experience Christian joy more deeply, more constantly? It is because we are falling into a routine in our relationship with God.

Today God's message invites each one of us to renew our Christian joy. In order to do that you are called to refresh your friendship with Christ, because that is the source of Christian joy.

We also ask for forgiveness, and renew our commitment to be more faithful in the future. Since Christ's love for us is personal and total, even our small acts of unfaithfulness sadden him.

Whenever we ignore the teaching of his Church, whenever we ignore the voice of conscience, whenever we fail to forgive, whenever we fail to love our neighbour as our-self, we sadden our Christ, who only wants the best for us. We put distance between him and us. That distance prevents our experience of Christian joy.

My dear sisters and brothers, God always loves us, and pays attention to us. Keep this in mind, and live this in the light of Christian joy.

Again we will continue to pray for the end of war in Ukraine. Enjoy warm weather and have a nice week. May God bless you all. - *Fr. Louis Nguyen*

Standing up to corporate power in Honduras The People and Planet First campaign is about helping communities stand up to corporate power. In Honduras, as in much of the Global South, corporations often threaten and criminalize activists who speak up against their abuses. The Lenca Indigenous leader Víctor Vásquez was imprisoned for fighting the corporate takeover of his people's ancestral territory. Development and Peace's partner, the Honduran Centre for the Promotion of Community Development (CEHPRODEC), helped free him from jail. Another partner, Caritas Choluteca, trains and accompanies community leaders in advocating for policies that respect human rights and the environment. Recently, they got mayoral election candidates to undertake to declare the municipality of Orocuina a mining-free zone if elected. Sacred Fire and Prayer Wave for Healing and Reconciliation In Support of Indigenous Delegation to Rome – March 28 – April 1, 2022 Friends in the Lord, Our Lady of Guadalupe Circle

Proverbs 28:13 Whoever conceals his transgressions will not prosper, but he who confesses and forsakes them will obtain mercy.

This year has brought great sadness and shame to this land called Canada and to its Catholic faithful with the sweeping discoveries of unmarked graves raising awareness of our part in residential school history. These events have increased the discomfort of the Catholic faithful trying to reconcile their understanding of the Catholic faith and how the horrors of residential school experiences occurred under the care of its leaders.

The summer and fall of 2021 witnessed individual apologies from many dioceses involved in running residential schools across Canada, a formal apology by all Catholic bishops in Canada followed by a \$30M National Financial Pledge to support healing and reconciliation initiatives, and an announcement of Pope Francis' willingness to visit Canada.

This time of heightened awareness has potential to be a pivotal moment in the history of the Catholic church in Canada as Pope Francis hears directly from Indigenous Peoples in personal encounters with each of three distinct groups of delegates - First Nations, Metis, and Inuit – and in a final audience with all delegates together. We, the Catholic faithful, have an opportunity to be in spiritual solidarity with the delegation in Rome, by educating ourselves on the history of residential schools in Canada and by praying that Spirit may guide these grace-filled encounters.

We express our gratitude to you as you receive this invitation. We will pray that Our Lady of Guadalupe intercede with her Son to shower abundant graces among and between us, for the conversion and healing of hearts, as we continue our journey of truth and reconciliation.

In the Catholic church, light has always had a special significance because it represents Christ. The light signifies our prayer, which is offered in faith, entering the light of God. In Indigenous spirituality, the Sacred Fire starts a ceremony or sacred event; it is a sacred practice meant to make individuals feel open, grounded, and connected with people on Earth and those who have moved on. **On March 28, 2022**, as the encounter begins, in solidarity with the Indigenous Fire Keepers keeping the Sacred Fire in your region and across this land, we invite all of you to light a fire or a candle and to pray. It is suggested each Diocese partner with Catholic Women's League of Canada, Knights of Columbus, and other groups to ensure commitment to continuous prayer across each region's prayer time.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
