A Note from Your Pastor

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

This weekend we celebrate the First Sunday of Lent. Now we will accompany Jesus in his fight with the devil and his encounter with God, as we are on a 40-day journey of praying, fasting and giving alms.

First of all, we should be aware that what Jesus passed on, in all his three temptations, was no playacting. It was real, it was true. The temptations of Jesus are the temptations of us all: to live for material things alone, to seek one's own glory rather than God's glory, and to abandon the worship of God for the worship of worldly power and fame. But we also should remember that God is with us in all our struggles, helping us to overcome them. I invite you to reflect on Jesus' lessons through his temptations in the wilderness.

The **first temptation** was to turn stones into bread. The word "bread" can mean material things in general. This was the temptation to give people what they want rather than to give them what they need. We see the comfort or seeking in this one. Jesus has been fasting for 40 days. He's probably a little bit hungry and the devil tempts Jesus to turn stones into bread, putting his comfort ahead of the Father's will. Food is good, but it will not fill our hearts.

The **second temptation** was to set up a political kingdom to resort to power rather than to love. People are always tempted to replace love by power. It is easier to control others than to love them, easier to dominate people than to become their servant.

We see pride in this one. The devil takes Jesus to a mountaintop and shows him the whole world, saying I'll give you all of this, if you bow down and worship me. Success is good, but it won't fill our hearts.

And the **third temptation** was doing something amazing in order to elicit faith.

We see vanity in this one. The devil suggested that Jesus throw himself off of the temple, because the angels will save him. The respect of others is good, but it won't fill our hearts.

All three temptations come down to the same thing in the end: to put material things and his own glory first and spiritual things and God second, if at all.

Temptation is truly present with us. From morning until the end of day, we are challenged, faced with it. Remember in the Lord's Prayer, Jesus taught us to say: "lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil."

Jesus shows us how to respond to the temptations. He does this by proposing three ways to put something else before God. And what's Jesus' response to all this? I know these things can make me happy but I will choose my Father's will above everything else. He shows us how to put God first.

Now I would give you some suggestions of practical ways to experience the peace that comes from putting God first. Lent is 40 days long, the same amount of time that Jesus fasted and prayed in the desert. What about trying one of these time-tested ways over the next 40 days?

- Mass: Coming to Mass is the ultimate way to put God first in our lives. Through the celebration we receive Christ in the Eucharist, and give public witness to our faith. Therefore, in addition to Sunday Mass, consider coming to daily Mass a couple times during the week this Lent. Why not?
- Visiting Christ in the Eucharist: Jesus says, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." (Mt 11.28) He cares about us so much that he is always here waiting for us. He wants to spend time with us. He puts us first. Can we spend half an hour each week with Jesus in the Eucharist? Why not? It will change our lives.
- Daily Prayer: We come to know God in prayer. Perhaps you could dedicate 15 minutes a day in silent prayer. You could use the Bible or a prayer book. Prayer is not complicated. You can pray anywhere; what's important is that you stick with it every day.

• Fasting: Can you say: I could restrict my internet use and dedicate that time to be with my family or to reach out to someone who is lonely. I could look to build others up in my speech instead of tearing them down.

I wish all of you, parishioners of St. Gerard's to have a blessed Lent, a wonderful experience to know how to put God first and make this Lent a sacred time in each of us.

And during this Lent, let's say this prayer which I combined from different prayers, every day to pray for our sisters and brothers in Ukraine.

Pray for Peace in Ukraine

God of peace and justice,

Who change the hardened of heart and break the power of violence, we entrust the people of Ukraine to you. Protect them in this time of peril; let them know not death but life, not slavery but freedom.

You are the Father of all, and we are sisters and brothers. Give us the strength to live that truth in love, choosing peace not war.

Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on the people of Ukraine and all the world, pour the spirit of peace into the heart of all, and help us to be peacemakers. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Learning from Jesus' Temptations

Every Lent, priests, nuns, monks, and many laypeople pray the following: "Be sober and vigilant. Your opponent the devil is prowling around like a roaring lion looking for [someone] to devour" (1 Peter 5:8). Jesus encountered this truth in his temptations in the desert, another place in his ministry where he experienced the struggle of humanity.

The temptations begin, "If you are the Son of God...." All our temptations begin by doubting and challenging

Jesus to prove himself. Although Jesus is all-powerful and all-good, we struggle to make sense of suffering and tragedies.

The temptations continue as Jesus is invited to satisfy himself, impress others, and skip suffering. But Jesus responds repeatedly in humility. In the desert he doesn't turn stones into bread. He later does something far greater; he turns bread and wine into himself. When tempted, we cry out to him to soften the hard realities of our lives. And Jesus does just that. He suffers in his passion, dies, and rises again to become life-giving bread for us. He becomes manna in our desert.

When we wish for power, Jesus promises we will reign with him if we also let him suffer for us and we with him. The devil would have us take matters into our own hands, doubt God, and make him prove himself by our measures. Yet if we listen to Jesus, look at his answers, and learn from his life, then true power will be ours.

YOUTH REFLECTION

"The Desert"

This Week...

Jesus knows what it is like to be in the desert and to want God's help. He had his own desert experience, being tempted by the devil, feeling alone and isolated, and needing strength and faith. It happened to the Hebrews, it happened to Jesus, and it happens to us. Desert experiences can be retreats for us if we use them as a way to get closer to God.

For Your Reflection

The Hebrews were not happy with their slavery in Egypt. But they were not thrilled with being isolated in the desert land, either. In some ways, that was worse. But Jesus actually chose to retreat into the desert land. He followed the guidance of the Holy Spirit in his life and ended up in the desert for a long time.

Have you ever felt as if you were in a desert, alone and isolated - escaped from an old place perhaps, but not yet arrived at a new place? Which was worse - the place you had escaped from or the desert place? Why? What moved you to get on with your life journey in order to actually arrive at the new place? Or are you still in the desert? How do you know?

Jesus retreated to the desert because the Holy Spirit led him there. Has the Spirit ever led you to a place that ended up being a desert? Did you ever do "the right thing" and end up alone and isolated? What happened? Were you surprised? Angry? At peace? How does the bareness of desert-life give way to the rich fullness of growth-life?

Is there anything good about a desert experience? Without other distractions, all you have is yourself and God. In that situation, is it easier or harder to get closer to God?

Is it possible to become more in touch with God and not become more in touch with yourself? Why or why not? How does being in touch with yourself help your relationship with God? How do you get in touch with yourself?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
