#### SUNDAY CONNECTION

#### **First Reading**

Acts of the Apostles 8.5-8,14-17 The People of Samaria accept the Gospel of Jesus proclaimed to them by Philip.

#### **Responsorial Psalm**

*Psalm 66.1-7,16,20* Sing praise to God, all the earth.

#### Second Reading

*1 Peter 3.15-18* Be ready to give explanation for your hope in Christ.

#### **Gospel Reading**

John 14.15-21 Jesus promises his disciples that he will send them another advocate, the Spirit of truth.

#### **Background on the Gospel Reading**

Today's Gospel is a continuation of last week's Gospel: Jesus is speaking to his disciples at the Last Supper. In today's reading Jesus offers encouragement to his disciples, who will soon see him crucified. He reassures them that even though he will leave them, he will not abandon them. Instead he will send them the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, through whom the disciples will continue to live in union with Jesus.

Jesus uses the term *Advocate* to describe the Holy Spirit, whom the disciples will receive. Another word used to describe the Holy Spirit is *Paraclete*, a legal term meaning "one who offers defense for another." Note that Jesus says that he will send "another Advocate." Jesus himself is the first advocate, interceding for his disciples with the Father.

In today's reading Jesus contrasts his impending departure with the permanence of the gift of the Holy Spirit. Jesus will leave to return to the Father, but the Holy Spirit will remain with the disciples.

Through the gift of the Holy Spirit, the disciples will come to know and appreciate the unity of the Son and the Father. They will also understand that they too participate in the communion between the Father and the Son: "On that day you will realize that I am in my Father and you are in me and I in you" (John 14:20). Today's reading is one example of the contrast that John's Gospel presents between the community of disciples, to whom God will reveal himself, and the unbelieving world, which will remain in darkness. The unbelieving world cannot accept the "Spirit of truth," whom the disciples will receive. Only through the Spirit, will God's revelation and love be known.

#### FAMILY CONNECTION

The mystery of the Trinity can be difficult for us to grasp. Today's Gospel invites us to consider how the three persons—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit— work together so that God's salvation is made known to us. Jesus' mission is continued through the activity of the Holy Spirit in the lives of his disciples. We have received this same Spirit through our Baptisms. The Spirit, living and working within us, reveals the mystery of God's love for us. Just as the first disciples were not left orphaned, we are not orphaned; we remain in God's embrace through the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Gather your family and invite each family member to say what he or she knows about the Holy Spirit. Read aloud today's Gospel, John 14:15-21. What does Jesus say the Holy Spirit will do for the disciples? Through the gift of the Holy Spirit, we come to share in the love of God made known to us in Jesus. Pray together, thanking God for this gift of the Holy Spirit by praying the Prayer to the Holy Spirit.

#### What is Your Hope?

We have hopes for ourselves and others. We hope for good health, for fulfilling work, for settled lives for our children. As valuable as such hope might be, that is not what Peter is referring to in today's second reading. He is talking about religious hope: not hope that, but hope in. Not hope that God will give us what we ask, that God will supply what we cannot accomplish, that God will reward our faithfulness. That is also valid hope, but it is still not religious hope.

Genuine hope for those who believe in God is hope or trust in God. Period. Trust in God when we have no idea what the future might bring. Trust in God when all our best plans crumble before us. Trust in God when we face the terrors of illness and death. This is a trust or hope for which we do not provide God plans to follow so our needs get met as we think they should be. It is a hope that enables us to place ourselves into the hands of God.

This kind of hope asks for nothing and expects everything. Why? Because we are convinced that God loves us with a passion we can't possibly imagine and, therefore, wants what is best for us. This might seem like an impossible hope, but the reading goes on to list reasons to hope. God's love is exemplified by Jesus Christ, who "suffered for sins...that he might lead you to God" (1 Peter 3:18). Who could ask for more?

This kind of hope asks for nothing and expects everything... because God loves us with a passion we can't possibly imagine and, therefore, wants what is best for us.

of Catholic education. As St. Paul tells us so powerfully, our oneness with Christ is inseparable from our oneness with each other: "individually we are members, one of another." (Rom 12:5.)

We cannot walk a path toward God alone: we need each other and are incomplete without our neighbour. But it is Christ who "fully reveals" us to ourselves, who clarifies our calling, and helps us to journey together. (See Vatican II, *Gaudium et Spes* 22)

This always requires much love, listening, patience and forgiveness as we reflect on God's Word and prayerfully seek answers to the questions that arise among us today. May the witness of the many Saints and holy persons who have walked Our Lord's path with faith and courage, inspire us to walk, and even run, as we strive to have the same mind and heart of Jesus Christ in all things!
