INSTRUCTIONS FOR ATTENDING MASS

- EACH HOUSEHOLD must pre-register separately for Saturday/Sunday Mass. Online at www.stgerard.ca beginning TUESDAY morning (this week) until all seats are reserved or until Thursday at 12 noon (whichever comes first.)
- Maximum 30 people may attend Mass
- Members of the same household may sit together at the marked seating
- At least two-metres separation is required between households at all times, <u>even with masks</u> on. **Please arrive early**.
- Please follow the instructions of the Hospitality Ministers (Ushers) and Father Louis.
- The following must stay home for the sake of the wider community:
- People with COVID-19 symptoms, who live with someone with COVID-19, or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19
- Those who have travelled to/from a "hotspot", outside of Saskatchewan or outside Canada within the last 14 days
- Those who are waiting for COVID-19 test results, or have someone in their household waiting for test results

A Note from Your Pastor

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

The promise that Jesus made before his death is now coming true: "I still have many things to say to you but you cannot bear them now. When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth" (Jn 16.13). Indeed, He promised to send the Holy Spirit, and the coming of the Holy Spirit changed the disciples: the door was locked, all of them were in fear, and when the Holy Spirit came they became stronger in spirit with no more fear, and they became messengers for the Lord.

Today we also celebrate the birth of the Church. With the coming of the Holy Spirit, the Church is born. The Holy Spirit is the source of life. Into the souls of the group of twelve Jesus put a new Spirit, the Spirit of courage so they would become the builders for the early Church.

I invite all of you to reflect on the gifts that the Holy Spirit gave the disciples so that they would be able to speak a new language, as we hear in the first reading: "All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages as the Holy Spirit gave them ability" (Acts 2.3).

We all know that language of itself is not enough to bring people together, to make us in communion with one another. Speaking the same language does not necessarily mean that there will be a meeting of minds and hearts.

The Holy Spirit teaches the disciples to speak the new language. I wonder what languages the Holy Spirit taught them? I believe that it was the language of peace rather than of war; the language of reconciliation rather than of conflict; the language of co-operation rather than of competition; the language of forgiveness rather than of vengeance; the language of hope rather than of despair; the language of unity rather than of division, the language of love rather than of hate.

Do we need to learn and practice how to speak these languages? I would say that YES, especially in today's world. If I don't speak these languages, I don't have the Holy Spirit in me. On the other hand, if I have the Holy Spirit in me, I am able to speak these languages. When we have the ability to speak these languages, we have the ability to know a new culture - the culture of love, faith, hope, and joy.

Today the gifts of the Holy Spirit are renewed in each of us. The gifts of the Holy Spirit are: wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety and fear of the Lord. Do you know that wisdom, understanding, and counsel (or right judgment) guide our minds and assist our conscience in knowing right from wrong; fortitude (or courage) enables us to do the right things even when it is difficult or unpopular; and fear of the Lord is really awe and reverence for God?

The fruits of the Holy Spirit are love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Do you know that these fruits of the Holy Spirit help us to understand what the Holy Spirit is like? And because of the Trinity – three-in-one – the fruits of the Holy Spirit reveal to us what God is like. By cooperating with the grace and power of the Holy Spirit, these fruits become stronger within us.

I invite all of you to acknowledge the role of the Holy Spirit in your lives. Also, I encourage you to pray to the Holy Spirit and cooperate with Him. If we have Him, we will have joy and peace and grow in holiness.

Happy feast day of Pentecost to all of you! Thank you to all of you for your continued patience and diligence in keeping yourself and others safe and healthy during this pandemic time. Hopefully we will soon be back to normal and we will be able to welcome more to the celebration of the Eucharist than what we can now.

Have a blessed week with the abundant blessings of the Holy Spirit. *Holy Spirit, come. And renew the face of the earth.*

Bringing Home

The Patience of Mary

A common image of Mary—surrounded by the apostles in the upper room, awaiting the Holy Spirit—has a name: *Regina Apostolorum*, Queen of the Apostles. She is enthroned as Queen Mother because, when her Son the King was enthroned and lifted up, he told her, "Behold your son." With those words he entrusted Mary to the care of John, the apostles, and the whole Church. As any good queen and mother, she defends her own.

She is also called the Spouse of the Spirit, because it was in union with the Spirit that she engendered the Son. She also engenders him in the apostles and in our souls through her powerful intercession and waiting on the Spirit.

One of Mary's best qualities is waiting patiently until God's power arrives. After the annunciation she waited nine months with Jesus in her womb. Then she waited some thirty years while Jesus grew and prepared for his mission. She waited during his public life and watched as his fame spread, but also as his enemies plotted. She waited at the foot of the cross and endured that unending Holy Saturday until the resurrection. And she waited patiently on the first Pentecost Sunday for the coming of the gift of the Holy Spirit promised by her Son. She knew he would come through, as he always did.

We get impatient with God and want him to respond on our timetables according to our expectations. He waits to give us a chance to adapt our hearts to his plan and timing. He waits until the time is just right.

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COME, HOLY SPIRIT

The traditional prayer to the Holy Spirit can be a wonderful source of reflection.

Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and enkindle in them the fire of your love.

V. Send forth your Spirit and they shall be created. R. And you shall renew the face of the earth.

Come, Holy Spirit

The first movement of this prayer is to ask for the Holy Spirit to come to us. A lot goes into preparing our hearts to ask for the Holy Spirit to come, not the least of which is to acknowledge that there is a Holy Spirt and that we feel something missing without the presence of the Spirit in our lives. This is the Spirit Jesus promised to send us so that we would not feel orphaned. This is the Spirit that transformed the first disciples from people afraid and locked in to the upper room.

Fill the hearts of your faithful

This is a request for a heart filled with the Spirit. This isn't asking, "Give me a little bit of your Spirit." This is a bold request. We are asking that we might be filled - and therefore, transformed by the Spirit. No hesitation, no doubt, no fear, no judgment, now wrangling, no selfishness can remain. <u>Fill us. Fill me.</u>

Enkindle in them the fire of your love

Our prayer gets even more specific. We desire the love which only the Spirit can bring. We know it is a fire, and we ask for it. It is a purifying fire. It burns away all that is in the way. And, it warms whatever is cold. This fire brings a new vitality and courage. And, fire can be shared with others, without being diminished. <u>Set our hearts on fire. Set my heart on fire.</u>

Send forth your Spirit and they shall be created

Paul tells us, " So whoever is in Christ is a new creation: the old things have passed away; behold, new things have come. [2 Corinthians 5.17] We are asking the Spirit to make us a new creation. This is more than a new beginning or a fresh start. We are asking for a transforming renewal. Our lives can be new with the Spirit filling our hearts. <u>Give us/me your Spirit and make us/me new.</u>

And you shall renew the face of the earth

When we are on fire and renewed by the Spirit, we can become one with that Spirit's activity of renewing the whole world. We can be the fire that ignites other fires. We can work to bring reconciliation, healing, true justice and renewal for all the people on the face of the earth. Let me be part of your Spirit's fire for all God's creation.

Let us pray for the Holy Spirit to come to us and to our community.

This Week...

Pentecost Sunday is called the birthday of the church. This day celebrates the Holy Spirit coming to the followers of Jesus in a rush of wind and tongues of fire. The Spirit gave them the gifts they needed to go forth and be church. These gifs vary - they are as different as we are. But we are all needed, and we are all members of one united body.

For Your Reflection

Pentecost is called the birthday of the church because before Pentecost, there really was no church. Jesus had ascended back into the heavens, the Apostles were hanging around, scared and confused, and nobody knew what to do. Going out to baptize people and preach about Jesus was the last thing they had in mind because their lives would be in danger.

But Pentecost celebrates the coming of the Holy Spirit - the force that turned a bunch of frightened, mixed-up folks into the church. There was a rush of wind, tongues of fire, and then suddenly there was courage, knowledge, direction and commitment! Everyone started speaking and was understood, no matter what the language of the listener was! These were saints suddenly on fire with the Holy Spirit. And it all began with the wind and fire of the Spirit.

- What changes in you do you wish the Spirit could blow your way? How can you cooperate with the Spirit? In what ways do you need more courage, knowledge, direction, or commitment? What else might you need?

- In what ways are you and your parish like the disciples before Pentecost? In what ways are you and your parish like the disciples after Pentecost?

- When people speak about your school, would they say that it has school spirit? What do they mean by that? How is school spirit like the Holy Spirit?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
