INSTRUCTIONS FOR ATTENDING MASS

- Pre-registration for Saturday/Sunday Mass is required. Online at www.stgerard.ca beginning Monday morning until all seats are reserved or until Thursday at 12 noon (whichever comes first.)
- Each household must register separately
- Maximum 30 people may attend Mass
- Members of the same household may sit together at the marked seating
- At least two-metres separation is required between households at all times, <u>even with masks</u> <u>on</u>. Please arrive early.
- Please follow the instructions of the Hospitality Ministers (Ushers) and Father Louis.
- The following must stay home for the sake of the wider community:
- People with COVID-19 symptoms, who live with someone with COVID-19, or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19
- Those who have travelled to/from a "hotspot", outside of Saskatchewan or outside Canada within the last 14 days
- Those who are waiting for COVID-19 test results, or have someone in their household waiting for test results

A Note from Your Pastor

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

First of all, I would say that what we hear in the Gospel today is about relationships: the relationship between Jesus and His Father, the relationship between He, himself, and us, and the relationship between each of us. But Jesus is also talking about being in communion with him, having a strong connection with him: "Abide in me as I abide in you... Whoever abides in me and I in them bears much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing".

Nowadays many people ask: why should I go to Church? Why can't I just worship God in my own way? Isn't religion about my personal relationship with God? Here are some points to answer these questions:

From the earliest time, following Jesus was never just a private or personal matter. We can see it in the book of Acts, "All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need." (Acts 2.44-45).

Christians came together to live in community, to profess their faith in Jesus, to witness his resurrection and to live by his teachings. The profound reason for this is given to us by Christ himself, when he said, "I am the vine, you are the branches". The vine and the branches are one. There is a mutual connection of branch and vine, and branch with branch. To say "I will follow Jesus but not the Church" is to separate Jesus from the Church, to cut off the branches from the vine.

The first disciples of Jesus had seen him, broke bread with him, and spoke with him after his resurrection. As a result, they had a deep sense of connectedness with him, a connectedness from which they drew great strength. Jesus had chosen them. He had made them his friends, and sent them out to bear fruit, the fruit of love.

By this we know that we are "living branches" of the vine. There is a bond that exists between us and in the care we show for one another.

My dear sisters and brothers, we need to know that Christ doesn't ask us to be successful, but to be fruitful. Christ depends on us to produce fruit in the world. There is a huge difference between successfulness and fruitfulness. Success may come from power and control. Success brings rewards, and sometimes fame as well.

<u>Fruitfulness</u>, however, often comes from weakness and vulnerability, and frequently goes unrecognized and unrewarded.

We all have gifts. By developing, using, and sharing our gifts with others, we become fruitful. The world is anxiously waiting for fruit, especially at this time when we are living through a global pandemic.

To love is of most importance! God will make our love fruitful, whether we see that fruitfulness or not.

Today we thank Jesus for giving us the beautiful sense of communion with Him and others "I am the vine, you are branches... Abide in me as I abide in you... Whoever abides in me and I in them bears much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing".

We are aware that if we abandon Him we are nothing. If we want to bear fruit, we have to connect with Him in the Eucharist and His community, the Church.

Let us pay more attention to how we connect with the Church and its community. Be aware that we are members of the Church, the Body of Christ.

Have a wonderful first weekend of May. Spring is here!

Family Activity

The Family Mulch Pile

"I am the vine and you are the branches." Jesus used a plant analogy to teach us about life with him and life away from him.

Do you have a lawn that needs mowing or bushes that need trimming? Do yard or garden work with your family members. Then, take the trimming and create a small mulch pile. Take you family members to the pile a few days or a week later. What happened to the trimming in the pile? How do they compare with lawn or the branches that

still remain on the bushes? After the comparison, share John 15:5-8. Stress that our hearts, like the branches of the bushes, would die if we cut our hearts off from Jesus.



The Vine and the Branches Become One

Jesus himself picked the image of the vine to describe the reality of our being united to him and the Father. And this was not lost on early Christians. One of the first images they used to mark their graves was the vine and the branches.

An amazing thing about a vine and its branches is that you can't tell the difference between them. Look at a grapevine and try to determine which is the branch and which is the vine or trunk. You can't, since it appears as one seamless reality. Jesus invites us to be so close to him that we appear to be just like him — "other Christs," as our name Christian suggests!

Second, the sap that springs from the vine, runs through the branches, and matures in the fruit is all the same. The life in Jesus and the life in us as Christians are the same. He has given us the same Spirit that animated him, the Holy Spirit.

This is why Jesus can guarantee that, if we remain in him by listening to his word and following his Spirit, we will definitely bear much fruit. His word and Spirit cannot remain sterile in us.

The most important result of being united to Jesus and bearing fruit is that not only will we be united to him in this life, but this friendship will last for all eternity. That's why early Christians put vines on their tombs.

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Catechism Theme: "Apart from me you can do nothing" (CCC 2074)

"The fruit referred to in John 15.5 is the holiness of a life made fruitful by union with Christ. When we believe in Jesus Christ, partake of his mysteries, and keep his commandments, the Savior himself comes to love, in us, his Father and his brethren. His person becomes, through his Spirit, the living and interior rule of our activity."

How has trust in Christ made a difference in your life? In the lives of those around you?

Staying connected to Christ has a high price. Sometimes it costs us the respect of the world. Sometimes it costs us relationships with others. Sometimes it costs us a sense comfort and community.

But the price of life without Christ is much higher. Imagine what life would be like without faith, without good Christians spouses and friends, without a prayer life and worship to sustains us, without the goodness and Christian charity of others to help along the way. Imagine a life without Christ!

Even if we have to walk by ourselves, even if we have to be loners in the name of Jesus, we will never be truly alone. Remember whose team we're really on, whose name we can invoke in need. Ask and he will be there.

Is there someone you know who is lonely? How can you extend Christian hospitality and fellowship to them this week?

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Abiding Jesus, vou have connected us to the vine of divine love.

May your compassion for the world flow through us and lead us deeper into a relationship with you.

Help us turn towards our brothers and sisters most in need of care.

May your resurrected life bring new life and transform our hearts to best serve in your name.

Amen.

This Week...

We cannot do much good without Jesus. All that is good, all that is healthy, all that is right comes from Jesus, as does our very life. Branches have no life apart from the vine. For Your Reflection

The vine is the lifeline for the branches. If branches are cut off from the vine, they die. Jesus is our lifeline, and he often works through the people in our life.

- The Scriptures tell us that those who live in Jesus do good work and bear much fruit apart from Jesus, we cannot do anything worth doing. Do you know people who clearly live in Jesus and are doing good work? What are they like? How do you know they are living in Jesus? What good work do they do? How can you be more like them?
- Jesus says that if his words are living within us whatever we ask for in prayer shall be granted. What does it mean to have Jesus' words living within us? If his words are truly living within us, then what would our prayer be like?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
