A Note from Your Pastor.....

My dear Sisters and Brothers,

Today's Gospel is a parable. It is a special way Jesus liked using to illustrate for us a mystery hidden in it. We should not read it as a story, without taking time to reflect and wonder what the message in it is.

The Master in this parable stands for Christ; the servants stand for each one of us. Here is the first lesson we should think about: God is our Master and we are all his servants. *Do we think of ourselves as servants, as dependent on God?* We are living in a modern world, full of technological power and easy pleasures; likely, we seem to think of ourselves as the center.

It is very clear that this parable reminds us that we are not gods; we are not the center of the world; we are dependent upon God, and our mission in this life is to know Him, love Him, worship Him, and serve Him. When I reflect on the relationship between humans and God, I would say that only by doing God's will, we will find the happiness which we desire, because that is what we were created for. We are created to know Him, to be intimate with Him, to love Him, and to serve Him.

And finally this parable tells us how we are supposed to do this because God has given each of us a certain number of "talents". All the abilities and blessings we have received are from God. God has given them to us, and we are free to either waste our gifts, "burying them all" in fear, laziness, and greed, or to use them as Christ would have us use them in a way as he described in today's Gospel.

Once Mother Teresa was staying in Australia. While she was there, she visited an elderly man who lived in an old apartment in total isolation. He was ignored by people around him and his home was messy and dirty. She told him, "Please let me clean your house, wash your clothes and make your bed". In reply he said, "I'm OK like this". She said, "But you will be better if you allow me to do it". And then he finally agreed.

She was able to clean his house and wash his clothes. While she was cleaning, she saw a beautiful lamp, covered with dust; it looked like it hadn't been used in years. She asked him, "Don't you light that lamp? Don't you ever use it?". He answered, "No. No one comes to see me. I have no need to light it. Who would I do it for?"

And then she asked, "If our sisters come to visit you, would you light it every night?" He replied, "Of course". And from that day on he lit the lamp and the sisters came to visit him every evening.

Mother Teresa left Australia and she had completely forgotten about that encounter. One day she received a message from him: "Tell my friend that the light she lit in my life continues to shine still".

My dear Sisters and Brothers,

We are called to do the same. We are called to use our gifts, our talents, our time, our energy to bear more fruits from what God has given to us. I have two suggestions for you, and me, to do during this week:

- Use our talents in such a way that we can *light as many lamps* as possible, in as many different ways as possible, and
- Share the Good News of God's mercies, forgiveness, trust-worthiness, and love to all the people who are sick and dying with loneliness, selfishness, and regret.

Dear God, thank you for the blessings you have given me. May I use these gifts to build your kingdom, may my actions be a reflection of your love. May what I do today bring others close to you. May my words be kind and gentle and may the bring joy to others. This week help me to give back a portion of what you have given me. I ask this in Jesus' name. Amen. (Adapted from the "Stewardship Prayer")

What's Our ROI?

The Gospel today encourages good investments. Jesus heaps praise on the good servants who were faithful in small matters and rewarded with the joy of the master. The servant who aets called wicked and lazy is punished, not because he miscalculated a risk but because he feared his master and took no risk at all. He was frozen by the thought that he could lose everything, so he buries the talent and anxiously awaits the master's return. He is wicked, not for investing poorly, but for not investing at all. God has given us all so many talents, and he does so for us to enjoy a grand return on investment (ROI). He wants us to use our talents, work them, develop them, and at the end of our lives—enjoy showing him the way they have multiplied. Like a loving parent, he knows that much of our happiness is in developing and growing those talents with his grace. Those talents are a sign of his call and an invitation to step out in faith.

Parents, your job is to help your children develop their talents and dreams. A confident, enthusiastic, and risk-taking child is a sign of parents who know the balance of loving discipline, positive motivation, and a healthy distance. Children who feel secure in the love of their parents are willing to venture out and invest their talents, for they know someone will always be there to accompany them and catch them if they fall

Our loving God is the first to know this and so invites us with this parable to trust, invest, and enjoy the returns.

Your St. Gerard Parish COVID-19 Questions Answered

On March 18, 2020, Archbishop Donald Bolen, in keeping with the Code of Canon Law no. 87, granted to all the Catholic faithful dispensation from their Sunday obligation. This is still in effect.

What does this mean? As Roman Catholics, we have an obligation to attend Sunday Mass. Until further notice, Archbishop Don has granted an exemption from this obligation. For those who are unable or choose not to attend Sunday Mass at this time, you do not have to. Other ways to participate in Sunday Mass is to watch it on television or watch the YouTube Mass online, courtesy of Resurrection Parish & Christ the King Parish (Regina) and the Archdiocese of Regina.

Why do I need to wear a mask? All those who attend both daily and Saturday/Sunday Masses are asked to wear a mask. The parish has a small supply of masks for those who do not have one. Please remember to put your mask on before exiting your vehicle prior to entering the church. A mask protects you and others!

Why do I need to register each time that I arrive to attend Mass? In the event that someone who has attend Mass develops COVID-19, it is necessary for the parish to have the names and phone numbers of all in attendance for contact-tracing purposes.

YOUTH REFLECTION

"Using Our Talents"

This Week...

Although the Book of Proverbs was written in a patriarchal society that viewed a wife as a possession, the first reading for today still praises skill and labour above charm and beauty. This praise was countercultural at the time. In the second reading, the author warns the people not to be lazy, but to be alert and ready for the "day of the Lord" (end of the world), for they were certain that Jesus was returning to earth in their own lifetime. In the Gospel, Jesus praises the servants who take risks and work hard, not the servant who buries what he is given out of fear.

For Your Reflection

In the parable that Jesus tells in today's Gospel, the master praises the efforts of the first two servants, who used the talents they were given and improved upon them. The master criticizes the action of the third servant, who hid the talent, did nothing, and was paralyzed with fear.

- When have you been like the first and second servants, using your talents in a way that benefits yourself and others?

The last few lines of this Gospel passage might seem to contradict Jesus' usual message about the last being first. This passage appears to be saying that the first will be even further ahead, and the last will be left behind.

- Is this contradiction troubling to you? Why or why not? How do you see it?
- When Jesus speaks of the first becoming last and the last becoming first, he is usually speaking of humility and boastfulness. Those who pump themselves up are usually just full of hot air. Why would Jesus say that the humble ones are really the great ones?
- When Jesus speaks of the rich ones getting more, and the poor ones losing what they have, he is speaking in terms of laziness and activity. Those who act lazy usually become lazier, and they lose any initiative they once had. What kind of activity is Jesus encouraging us to do?

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
