#### A Reflection from Deacon Dave Hudy ....

#### Greetings everyone!

In today's gospel we hear about a scribe who poses a question to Jesus and then, after his question is answered, adds his insight to what Jesus has said. In other parts of the New Testament we have heard Jesus tell us that showing mercy is more important than offering sacrifice so that teaching is nothing new. But, in today's gospel it is not Jesus who is telling us how to place our priorities. Yes, Jesus does tell us that love of God and love of our neighbour are our two most important commandments. But it is the scribe who makes the call that these important commandments take precedence over all the burnt offerings and sacrifices in the world. It's the scribe who clarifies things for everybody! Like any good teacher Jesus allows his student to take part in the teaching of the lesson! At other times we have seen how Jesus seems to lose patience with the stubbornness of the scribes and Pharisees, but today we see that he is pleased to offer praise to a scribe who seems to be on the right track.

Jesus is not telling us anything new, he's not contradicting anything in the Old Testament. In Deuteronomy (10.12) we hear it said that God's people should "love and serve the Lord, your God, with all your heart and all your soul." If we love the Lord with our whole heart and soul, then it follows that everything else must take second place. Jesus reaffirms the need for us to trust God completely in our whole lives.

If we love God with all our hearts it follows that we will love our neighbours. It is in how we treat our neighbours that we show our love for God. God is not physically present to us but the people around us are! All of us are made in the likeness of God, so we prove our love for God by how we treat others. Once again, Jesus is not telling us anything new, this same commandment is found in Leviticus, Leviticus 19.18 tells us "Take no revenge and cherish no grudge against your fellow countrymen. You shall love your neighbour as yourself. I am the Lord."

Our Christian faith is built around these two commandments, everything else is built around them. If we love God, we will be drawn to religious practices that honour God. We will long to be at the Holy Mass and feel comfort in worshiping God together with others. Prayer will have a special place in our hearts. Affection for these practices will indicate that we have an affection not only for them but also for God. Such loves are built up over time, and need to be cultivated. We need to make a conscious effort to give priority to these things of God as opposed to the cares of this world. God will, after all, reward those who love God.

When our lives are over these are the things that will really count. Not only love of God, but also love of others. How did we treat those around us? Did we really love them as ourselves? Or did we use them for our personal gain or pleasure? This, I think, includes everyone in the world. If we aren't able to directly help those suffering in other parts of the world, do we at least pray for them with sincere hearts? We can ask ourselves this question often. When we see someone suffering what is our reaction? Do we assume that they likely caused their problems themselves or do we look on them with compassion without judging? And do we place them in God's hands through our prayer?

#### **God's Greatest Commandments**

Today's first reading recalls the most sacred text in Judaism, the Shema Israel: "Hear [O] Israel." These words are so sacred for Jews, they are prayed in the most important moments of peril or supreme holiness. Jews don't take these words lightly because they express the essence of their religion and relationship to God.

As Catholics, we fully agree with our Jewish brothers and sisters on this matter. Jesus himself answered the question of what was the first, greatest commandment—it was the Shema Israel. Why is it so important? Because it declares the unity of God: "The Lord is our God, the Lord alone!" (Deuteronomy 6:4). He is one supreme God, not a multitude of divinities as in the Greek and Roman polytheistic religions, or even today in Hinduism and Buddhism.

This belief in one God makes the monotheistic religions of Judaism and Christianity unique. Second, this supreme God deserves our love and obedience. "You shall love the Lord your God...." Our role as creatures called and saved by him is to offer loving obedience.

The Second Commandment flows from the first: If we love God above all, then we need to love our brothers, sisters, and ourselves.

What better example is there of this love for God and neighbor than the love of a mother for her child? Our love for God should be reverent, tender, compassionate, and unique. Only you can give him your kind of love. There should be a constant flow of affection and union between us—no separation between him and us

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#### STEWARDSHIP REFLECTION

Stewardship calls us to experience social friendship, seek what is morally good, and practice a social ethic because we know we are part of a universal fraternity. We are called to solidarity, encounter, and gratuitousness. May our hearts be open to the call of synodality and solidarity in our day to day interactions.

# Catechism Theme: Overview to the Ten Commandments (CCC 2052-2055)

Christianity has always used the "Great Commandment" as a lens to view the Ten Commandments. The first three commandments fulfill love of God. The last seven fulfill love of neighbor. Living out the Great Commandment fulfills the Law (see Romans 13:9-10).

But, the command to love demands more. To love God requires God's help. It requires an openness to the Spirit. We cannot possibly live out God's Law by ourselves. With his help, we can hope and we can experience results.

What is this the most important value in your faith? What religious insight or practice has had the greatest impact on your life? Who exemplifies that insight or practice or value in your life?

What's most important? What's first? With apologies to the late Bud Abbot and Lou Costello, the question can be put another way for the Christian. Who's on first? Just as that line set up the classic comedy routine, that line sets up our perspective on life. Who's on first in our life? Is it us or Jesus? If the answer is us, we're on our own. For, we have put ourselves in God's place. So there is no room for God or others. If, however, the answer is Jesus, we can rest assured God is helping us to love him with our very being and everyone else as ourselves.

Who's on first? For most of us, the answer to the question vacillates between us and God. What can you do this week to place more of the focus on God? How can he help you to love him more and see everyone around as your equal?

#### YOUTH REFLECTION

#### "The Commandments"

#### This Week...

This first reading is the Shema, the most treasured prayer of the Jewish tradition. You will find it on the doorpost of many Jewish homes. It means "Hear, O Israel!" In the reading it announces the great commandment of love. Jesus, our one high priest, shows us that love is more important than anything. Loving yourself, loving your neighbour, and loving God are connected. Loving your neighbour comes more easily when you can love yourself, and loving God is most easily expressed by loving your neighbour. Jesus and this scribe both appreciate each other's insights on love; it is obvious in the warmth of their conversation.

#### For Your Reflection

Jesus tells us that loving God completely, loving our neighbours, and loving ourselves are our highest commandments.

- How are all the other commandments based on these?
- Is it ever all right (not sinful) to do something wrong, if no one will ever know about it and no one will ever be hurt by it? How does committing a sin even a secret sin that is never caught hurt you?

Every time you make a selfish decision, you teach yourself to be selfish. Every time you lie, you teach yourself to be dishonest. Every time you make a considerate decision, you teach yourself to be caring. Every time you make a moral choice, you teach yourself to have integrity. Every time you do the right thing, you feel more confident, you like yourself more, and you respect yourself more.

- If everyone understood these concepts, how would it change the world?
- Is it possible to know and understand these concepts, but to ignore them? What kind of decision would it be to ignore them? Why would someone do that?
- Whom do you respect? Why do you respect him or her?
- Do you respect yourself? Why or why not?

Jesus and this scribe seem to like each other. They affirm each other's words. It's hard to tell who's the teacher and who's the learner.

- Do you know a teacher who has a similar relationship with you? What is that relationship like?



**RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA)** is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

**Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church.** If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
