In Touch with the Word

Choosing God or Money

Scripture:

- •Amos 8.4-7. Amos scolds the unjust merchants who trample upon and cheat the poor. He insists that their sin of greed will not be forgotten.
- •1 Timothy 2.1-8. In a letter to Timothy, Paul urges that prayers be offered for kings and others in authority.
- •Luke 16.1-13. Jesus teaches us that we cannot live our life for money if we wish to live our life for God.

Theme:

Greed, dishonesty, and injustice abound in our world. Amos warns that greedy actions will be remembered. Jesus warns us to be trustworthy in small matters, so we might be trusted in larger matters. And in the midst of this problematic and imperfect world, Paul asks us to pray for the people who govern us.

Reflection:

Jesus tells an interesting story to lead up to his warning about greed, or love for money. A rich man fires his manager, and that manager makes allies among his customers by reducing the amount of their debt to the rich man. Rather than being angry, the rich man liked this manager's shrewdness. It takes one to know one!

Obviously Jesus does not want us to be dishonest, but he does want us to be resourceful. If we served the Reign of God with as much savvy as this manager served himself, think of what might happen.

- Friendships can be political. Jesus knows that. What is he telling us about the friendships we form and the way trust can affect relationships?
- How does greed or love for money get in the way of serving God? Is there money you do not need to spend on yourself that might be used in a less selfish way? What might you do with that amount of money?

FAMILY ACTIVITY

Talk with your children about some things that they have done to show that they can be trusted. Talk a bit about what it means to be responsible. Responsibility often means that we put aside something of passing value for something of greater value.

Read together the short form of today's Gospel, Luke 16:10-13. Talk about the importance of responsible use of money and our material possessions. As a family, commit to one action that you will take this week to show that your family serves God and not money.



Do What You Say You're Going to Do

There is a life lesson in today's Gospel: the person who can be trusted with minor matters, may be trusted with great matters. Likewise, if you can't manage the small stuff, then forget about dreaming big.

This may seem obvious, but we deny the obvious every day. For example, if we overspend our bank account, don't we imagine that having more money is the answer? For the very poor this may be true, but sometimes even those who are comfortable quickly spend their raise or bonus and before they know it, they're overdrawn. There are even winners of the lottery who, before they know it, find themselves with a negative bank balance. When it comes to money, no matter the amount, there are only three possibilities: spend what we have, spend more than we have, or spend less than we have.

Or think about folks whose houses are cluttered with too much stuff. Having a bigger house looks like the answer and yet it doesn't take long to fill up more closets.

We imagine that a "little lie" is okay. "Fibbing" we call it. Yet, fibbing here and cheating there and soon we're able to tell real whoppers without giving it much thought.

We imagine that "just a few" cookies while on our diet won't matter too much. Skipping our walk just for today can't hurt. Putting off until tomorrow the dishes—or our homework or writing a thank you note or returning a call — "just this once" doesn't matter. Missing Sunday Mass is OK if it's not every Sunday. Calling in sick when we need a break—well, everyone does it.

These are the habits of failure and they all start with small stuff. When life seems to be in shambles or it feels like we are spiraling out of control, we might consider trying this: Let's do what we say we are going to do. Period. If we're not eating sweets, then don't eat them. If we're Catholic, we're obliged to go to Sunday Mass, so we go. If we own it and it's dirty, clean it. If we don't have the money, we don't buy it. If we said we'd meet someone at 3 pm, we don't show up at 3:10.

If we do what we say we're going to do, life becomes simpler, and we also feel better about how we are living it because we are keeping out word. We don't have to keep making the same decision over and over because that decision is already made. And we find ourselves becoming people who can be trusted with great matters. It starts with the small stuff.

The Canadian government proclaimed September 30th as a new national statutory holiday, a National day for Truth and Reconciliation to honour survivors, their families, and communities. The Catholic Church has a significant role and responsibility for Truth and Reconciliation in Canada.

With the recent visit of Pope Francis on his Penitential Pilgrimage to Canada, this day gives us an opportunity to reflect on the history of residential schools, and grow in our understanding towards a commitment to true healing and reconciliation.
