A Note from Your Pastor

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

In the second reading for this weekend, we hear these words: "You do not have because you do not ask. You ask and do not receive, because you ask wrongly, in order to spend what you get on your pleasures." (James 4.3)

After reading these words a few times, I asked myself, what is St. James talking about? And to be honest, I also asked myself: why is he saying this? His words are very much in conflict with what Jesus says in Matthew 7.7: "*Ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you.*"

Most of us have had the experience as St. James says. We have prayed a lot, we have tried and worked hard, but it does not seem to work. Our prayers haven't been answered. What we expect to see does not seem to happen and, for sure, sometimes we may have feelings of frustration or disappointment. Today, through the second reading, St. James gives us the answer: It is because we don't have a purity of heart.

You might agree with me that sometimes it is possible to do something fine, right and good on the outside, while having selfish motives on the inside. We lack something, something of great value within us. What we really need to have is a purity of intention in our hearts.

I believe that, as Christians, we are called to make spiritual maturity by following Christ both on the outside and, especially, on the inside. We are called to do what is morally right, even when it is difficult or unpopular, to be patient and forgiving with people who drive us crazy, and to find creative ways to encourage and support those around us. "Do to others as you would have them do to you." (Luke 6.31)

But it also involves forming ourselves, in a Christian way, such that we recognize that every single person, starting with oneself, is valued, esteemed, and appreciated by God; to want what is best for every person, regardless of whether or not we happen to get along with them; and to consider other people just as important as ourselves.

To me, purity of intention is a huge challenge. It seems like something only Saints could do. But that is not true because, with God's grace, we can all gradually grow in this virtue. We need to develop this if we want to achieve true love.

My dear sisters and brothers, it is very clear that in the Gospel today Jesus describes the path to greatness as one of service. And not just any service: the humble service by being willing to lay down our life for the benefit of another - to serve others, to make others happy, and to reach out to those who are weak and in need: the aged, the homeless and the downtrodden. God calls us to be a family, to love and take care of each other, to support and to be with one another when others are in need. That is what Jesus invites us to do today, to seek and serve those who are poor, who are weak and who are in need, in His Name.

Greatness in Christ's Kingdom is equated with humility, an attitude of the heart that puts the good of others ahead of one's own preferences: it is self-giving, not self-getting.

You and I, we should say that no matter how great we become in the eyes of others, we can never neglect even the smallest members of our society, because our only ambition should be to serve. We are called to serve, serve others with a humble heart and full of love.

I invite all of you to continue to reflect and think about this.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving

grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are nonbaptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.

Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.

Jesus' Cleansing Love By Fr. Mark Haydu, LC

The Master of Fossa, a painter of unknown name, traveled the Umbrian region in the 1300s, creating works of Franciscan spirituality. His triptych panel, *Stories of the Passion*, interprets the scenes of the passion and death of Christ as an act of service to poor sinners. The souls of his brothers and sisters were dirty. And yet he comes down from heaven, bends over our iniquity, and gently takes us into his hands while nursing us back to cleanliness and life.

Christ's greatness is revealed in his service. "If anyone wishes to be first, he shall be the last of all and the servant of all" (Mark 9:35). Jesus didn't wish to be first; he merely wished to be faithful. His goal was to love the Father and win us back, and that meant service and the cross.

In a detail of the painting, Peter is on his papal throne while Jesus kneels in front of him. What a role reversal! Peter should be washing Jesus' feet, but no. Even Peter tried to reject this act of service, but Jesus insisted—or else Peter could have no part in his reign.

Peter needed to be washed and purified before serving and sanctifying others. So it is with us. During this Mass, allow your soul to be taken into Jesus' hands. Feel him cleanse you, pouring his warm grace over your wounds. Accept his gentle, loving attention as he caresses, dries, and restores you. Only when you have known his mercy and love can you then be an agent of that love to others.

The Attack of the Wicked Upon the Righteous

~ A Reflection on Wisdom 2.12,17-20 ~

People gossip. They always will. Sometimes their talk is idle chatter. Sometimes their gossip turns ugly, slanderous, and, ultimately, vengeful. So, the innocent suffer from the venom of those who speak behind backs and seek their brand of "justice" in the dark. The believer suffers at the hands of those who hate God. The righteous suffer at the hands of the jealous and the devious.

In these passages from the "Wisdom of Solomon," the author wrote about the true nature of evil. It sought vengeance upon the just, almost without reason. In the context of the book, the wise (i.e., the person who followed God's will and tried to live a good life) would prevail, but only through God's help. Living out that trust divided the good from the bad. It was that trust that drove the wicked to frenzied action.

Trust in God has a price. Sometimes trust costs us our reputation. Sometimes it costs us relationships. In the case of a few, it cost them their lives. But, trust means that God will win out in the end. It means he will save us. It means the price is worth paying.

YOUTH REFLECTION

"The Last Shall Be First"

This Week...

The Book of Wisdom explains why Jesus was put to death: the wicked cannot tolerate goodness; they are shamed and threatened, so they seek to destroy it. James echoes the same theme when he says that quarrels happen when people envy what they cannot acquire, and their inner cravings make war. Yet wisdom cultivates peace, and the harvest is justice. The Apostles are not cultivating peace in the Gospel reading; instead they are arguing over who is "number one" - quite the opposite from what it takes to be number one, according to Jesus.

For Your Reflection

At every football or baseball or basketball game, you can see them - the giant hands with the index finger pointing up, and the rest of the fingers curled together. They usually say "number one."

- Jesus says if we focus on being number one, then we certainly are not number one. If we try to say we are the best, or the most important, or the greatest, then we truly are not. If we do our best to not brag but to serve everyone else's needs and to build up everyone else's confidence, that is the way to true stardom. How hard is it to be that way when the culture urges us to be number one? How would Jesus handle it if he were a teenager at your school this year? Can you follow his example? How? Why or why not?

Many teenagers report that they have more fun being members of intramural teams than they do on a varsity or junior varsity team. They play more often, receive less criticism, and are under less pressure that way.

- How is that preference related to the message of this Gospel?

If the goal is to always win and be the number one team, then most players fail, because there can only be one number one team in whatever sport, league, or district you participate in; only one team can win. Everyone one else loses. But if your goal is to learn, to put out the best possible effort, to improve, and to have fun, then everyone can succeed; everyone wins. The score doesn't matter. No one loses.

- How is this philosophy of sports related to the Gospel message?

- Could this philosophy of sports ever work in the professional area? Why or why not? In the high school area? Why or why not? In the grade school are? Why or why not?

- Where does money enter into the picture? How is money connected to the current philosophy of sports? What would Jesus say about this connection>
