## YOUTH CONNECTION FOR THE TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



On the 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year B, the readings invite us to reflect on humility, wisdom, and service. These themes challenge us to examine how we live our faith and interact with others. Let us explore the messages in these readings to deepen our understanding and commitment to following Christ.

TRUE WISDOM The first reading from the Book of Wisdom speaks of the just person suffering because of their righteousness. The wicked plot against the just, trying to see if God will save them. This passage reminds us that living a righteous life may lead to suffering and opposition.

We can learn from this reading that true wisdom is not always appreciated. Sometimes, doing the right thing brings challenges and hardships. However, we are called to remain faithful and trust that God sees and knows our struggles.

This reflection helps us understand that wisdom from God leads us on a path that may not be easy, but it is the right path. We should seek wisdom that brings peace, righteousness, and a closer relationship with God. Staying true to this wisdom, even when it is hard, is our call as Christians.

HUMILITY AND SERVICE In the Gospel, Jesus teaches his disciples about true greatness. He tells them that whoever wants to be first must be the servant of all. He then places a child in their midst, showing them that welcoming the least is welcoming Him.

This lesson on humility and service is crucial for us. Jesus turns the idea of greatness upside down. Instead of seeking power and status, He calls us to serve others, especially those who are vulnerable and in need.

By serving others with humility, we follow Jesus' example. It is not about being noticed or praised, but about genuine care and love for others. This is how we live out our faith and show the world the love of Christ.

RIGHTEOUS LIVING The second reading from the Letter of James speaks about the conflicts that arise from selfish desires. James urges us to seek peace and righteousness instead of giving in to jealousy and selfish ambition. He reminds us that true wisdom comes from God and leads to good deeds.

Righteous living means putting God's will above our own desires. It involves seeking peace, being gentle, and showing mercy. These actions reflect God's wisdom and bring harmony into our lives and communities.

James' message encourages us to examine our motives and actions. Are we driven by selfishness, or are we seeking to live in a way that honours God and serves others? By choosing righteousness and peace, we align our lives with God's will.

PRAYER Lord, grant us true wisdom to seek Your will above our own. Help us to serve others with humility and love. Guide us to live righteously and in peace. Amen.

#### The Price of Goodness

We all know genuinely good people. Somehow, they are able to live the virtues of their religious tradition. It might even appear that it is easy for them to do so. One would think that such good people would be valued. Well, yes and no. While we might truly value the goodness of others, that goodness can also shame us. And there is the rub. People are uncomfortable with the realization that they are not as good as they think—or not as good as others might view them. Today's readings underscore the price we might have to pay for such goodness.

The first reading describes a plot being devised to get rid of a righteous person whose goodness has become "annoying" (Wisdom 2:12). This is not someone who flaunts goodness; it is a genuinely good person, one who is referred to as "the righteous one" (2:18). (Here "son of God" simply means someone belonging to the people of God.) The plotters insist that God will come to the rescue if the righteous one is truly good. The petitions in the psalm response are placed on the lips of that righteous one. Like many good Bible stories, this story is open ended. We do not know what happens. The price paid for righteousness is found in the Gospel passage as well. Here the righteous one is Jesus. Though we know how his story ends, here the disciples did not.

Today we are faced with the starkness of these stories. Are we willing to pay the price of goodness?

# FAMILY CONNECTION FOR THE TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Gospel Reading Mark 9.30-37

Jesus teaches his disciples that the greatest are those who serve all.

Conversations such as the one described in today's Gospel are common in family life. Perhaps these examples are familiar: "I should get the first piece of cake because I am the youngest;" "I did the dishes yesterday; someone else should do them today." How might we respond if Jesus asked about our family arguments? What would Jesus say to us in reply? All of us need the reminder found in today's Gospel: To be great in God's Kingdom is to be the servant of all.

As you gather as a family, recall a recent family argument about household chores or an example of bickering among family members. Talk about what was at issue in the argument. Together imagine that Jesus entered the room just as the argument ended. What would you tell Jesus your argument was about? What might Jesus say in reply? Read together today's Gospel, Mark 9:30-37. How was your family argument like the argument among Jesus' disciples? What might your family do to remember that those who are great in God's kingdom are those who willingly serve others? Pray together that your family life will reflect your commitment to serve one another with love. Pray Saint Ignatius of Loyola's Prayer for Generosity.

# **National Day for Truth and Reconciliation**

September 30th is the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation to honour survivors, their families, and communities. The Catholic Church has a significant role and responsibility for Truth and Reconciliation in Canada. We'd like to encourage you to look for events in your community that you can participate in or find other ways to educate yourself on truth and reconciliation. The office of the Archdiocese of Regina will be closed on Monday, September 30 in honour of this day.

### **CENTERING PRAYER**

"Be still and know that I am God." Psalm 46

God is closer than breathing, closer than thinking, closer than choosing and closer than consciousness itself.

Centering Prayer is not meant to replace other kinds of prayer; rather it gives new light and depth of meaning to prayer.

It's an invitation to interior silence and to the Divine Indwelling.

"Whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you." Matthew 6:6

It is an opportunity to let go of external circumstances and their turmoil and to let go of the interior noise of our thoughts and feelings; "to close the door" so to speak. It is allowing our awareness to join the hidden God where He dwells secretly in us and is waiting for us.

God's first language is silence. We do not analyze our prayer, have expectations for our prayer or aim at some specific goal.

It's a way to quiet the mind. It is simply resting in God beyond thoughts, words and feelings.

## The Guidelines

- 1. Choose a sacred word as the symbol of your intention to consent to God's presence and action within. A simple inward glance toward the Divine Presence, or noticing one's breath may be more suitable for some persons. The same guidelines apply to these symbols as to the sacred word.
- 2. Sitting comfortably and with eyes closed, settle briefly and silently introduce the sacred word, as the symbol of your consent to God's presence and action within.
- 3. When engaged with your thoughts, images, feelings, body sensations, return ever-so-gently to the sacred word.
- 4. At the end of the prayer period, remain in silence with eyes closed for a couple of minutes. Listen as the leader recites the Lord's Prayer.
