A Note from Your Pastor

My Dear Sisters and Brothers,

This week we will take time to reflect on the topic that makes us feel uncomfortable to talk about: sin matters. "Indeed, the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing until it divides soul from spirit, joints from marrow; it is able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart" (Hebrews 4.12). God loves us with a steadfast love. But this doesn't mean that He will never correct us or that he will never challenge us to check if we are on a wrong path or that we are able to be on the right path.

What we hear in the second reading is a good example. St. James explains that if someone is exploiting and using other people, lying and cheating and hoarding wealth, they may enjoy the fruits of their crimes for a little while, but they cannot escape justice forever. He says that they will "weep and wail over their miseries".

St. James is clear, direct, and unwavering in his condemnation of sin. He reminds those who read this letter that if they let greed dominate their lives, if they commit injustices against others in order to enjoy comfort themselves, they will not escape their punishment, and it will be a painful punishment.

Vanity, all is vanity. We know that what we possess in this life, one day we cannot bring to the next life. We are called not to be selfish but to be open to see the needs of others, to be generous and share what we have. "Pay attention to what you hear; the measure you give will be the measure you get, and still more will be given you. For those who have, more will be given; and from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away" (Mark 4. 24-25).

Jesus is just as clear, too. He explains that un-repented sin has consequences; it leads to condemnation. He is strongly warning us to be careful for whatever can cause us to sin. He is not only warning us, but he asks us if something is causing us to sin, we need to be rid of it.

"If your hand causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life maimed than to have two hands and to go to hell, to the unquenchable fire; and if your foot causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life lame than to have two feet and to be thrown into hell, and if your eye causes you to stumble, tear it out; it is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than to have two eyes and to be thrown into hell, where their worm never dies, and the fire is never quenched" (Mark 9.43-18).

My dear sisters and brothers, these comments of St. James and Jesus are not meant to scare us into feeling guilt - it's not some psychological manipulation technique. Rather, they are simply informing us about the facts: SIN, willfully turning away from God and his moral law, has consequences, and we should strive to avoid them.

Sin puts a spiritual millstone around our necks that one day will drown us and destroy our intimacy with God, therefore we should seek His help to liberate us. Charity, however, even in the smallest way, brings us up and liberates us from those sinful attachments that threaten to drown us for good.

I invite all of you to re-read one of two readings, St. James in the second reading, or the Gospel, and to continue to reflect and pray on the message. Keep in mind that God loves us as sinners, but he hates sin.

I wish for you all to enjoy the first week of autumn.



Protect Life

The tapestry by Pieter van Aelst in the Vatican Museum, Slaughter of the Innocents, may not seem to have much to do with today's readings, yet it does. Let me explain: This wall-size work of art depicts the murder decreed by Herod of all the children two years and under. It was his desperate effort to extinguish any possibility that the Messiah might eventually contest his throne.

The reading of James could very well be applied to the greedy and avaricious Herod. "You have lived on earth in luxury and pleasure; you have fattened your hearts for the day of [your own] slaughter" (James 5:5). All the wealth, authority, and success he had only led him to be more grasping and insecure. Anyone who sees a threat to his own well-being in the birth of a child reveals his own internal poverty of spirit.

Rather than remove the little ones from our lives, we should do all we can to edify and maintain their faith. Jesus, as well as James, has harsh words for anyone who would lead a little one to sin.

Herod was the first who needed to hear the words of the Messiah he was trying to silence. If anything causes you to sin, even something as precious as a hand or foot, it's better to cut it off and live physically impaired rather than maintain apparent wholeness while spiritually rotting from within. The life of our souls and that of the little ones is of paramount importance, and no material security should be placed ahead of it.

NATIONAL DAY FOR TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION SEPTEMBER 30

Terminologies:

Aboriginal- The descendants of the original inhabitants of North America; comes from the Latin word 'ab' (from) and 'origine' (origin, beginning). The Canadian Constitution recognizes three groups of Aboriginal people – "Indian, Metis and Inuit". These are 3 separate people with unique heritages, languages, cultural practices and spiritual beliefs.

Indigenous- All inhabitants indigenous to their lands and territories and their descendants; comes from the Latin word *indigen*, which means "spring from the land; native."

Using Indigenous over Aboriginal encourages territory acknowledgements, a practice which links Indigenous Peoples to their land and respects their claims over it. It recognizes their internationally legal right to offer or withhold consent to development under the United Nations Declaration of the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.

In Canada the accepted term for people who are Indigenous and who do not identify as Inuit or metis is *First Nations*.

1. **First Nations People** – Replaced the word Indian. Includes both Status and Non Status.

Status: person who meets the requirements of the Indian Act, who is registered under the Act.

Non-status: of Aboriginal descent, who does not meet the criteria of the Indian Act, or lost their status or despite meeting criteria, has not been registered as a Status Indian.

Treaty Indian: descendant of family members who signed treaties with the colonial government (British Monarchy). Generally, all Treaty Indians are Status, but Status Indians are not necessarily treaty Indians. They belong to a First Nation or Indian Band that signed a treaty with the crown.

- 2. **Metis** A person who self identifies as Metis, is distinct from other Aboriginal Peoples and is of historic Metis Nation Ancestry. They have a unique, mixed First Nation and European ancestry and culture.
- 3. **Inuit** Inuit Register defines as "Inuit" all children born to an Inuk and a person of another race, regardless of the race. People living mainly in Northern Canada, Greenland, Alaska and eastern Siberia, who are original inhabitants of the Arctic.

"A Cup of Water in Jesus' Name"

This Week...

Both Joshua and John have the same concerns. Both Moses and Jesus have the same response. Don't be so worried! Don't be such an elitist! Anyone can serve. If good work is being done, please don't stop it. Let it happen; in fact, encourage it.

Ames reminds us that the good work we don't do can hurt us. If others suffer from our lack of service, we will be held accountable for it.

For Your Reflection

In both the first reading and the Gospel, the same situation occurs. Joshua and John are concerned because an outsider is doing the kinds of things they are supposed to be doing. Moses and Jesus reassure them: There is nothing to worry about. The more, the merrier. Do not be jealous or insecure.

- When have you been jealous of someone else? When has someone's actions, talents, accomplishments, or friendships worried you? When have you begun to feel concerned that someone else's success might make your success less important or impressive?
- When has someone shut you out of their circle of friends? What was it like? How did you deal with it?
- Have you ever tried to shut someone out of your circle of friends? Why? What was the problem? What happened?

Jesus says that whenever we give someone even just a cup of water in his name, we will have our reward.

- What do you think it means to give something or to do something "in Jesus' name"?
- Have you had the opportunity to serve Jesus in that way but chose to put it off, or decided to do otherwise? What influenced your decision?
- Do you think most teenagers would see serving Jesus as a worthy goal or priority? Why or why not? If not, what do you think of that opinion? How is serving Jesus any different from making the world a better place?



RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (RCIA) is an incredible journey of discovery, the discovery of God's love in Jesus. If you or someone you know is interested in exploring the friendship and saving grace of Jesus Christ, we invite you to join us in the RCIA journey. It is a warm, welcoming experience that introduces the Christian faith in our Roman Catholic tradition. We explore topics such as Holy Scripture, the Sacraments, Church history and the core beliefs of the Church. Anyone who has taken this "leap of faith" has found it to be a life-altering experience.

The RCIA process is intended for those who are non-baptized. There are several rites and stages that are part of the process to prepare adults for Baptism and to receive the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Reception of Baptized Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church. If you have been baptized in another Christian tradition, the Catholic Church respects that baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of our rebirth in Christ and our immersion into His saving death and Resurrection. It can never be repeated. Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church happens after a period of preparation through catechesis, prayer and worship, and an introduction to Catholic life, values, and mission.



Adults who have been baptized in the Catholic Church but have not received the Sacrament of Confirmation can prepare for reception of this sacrament through a period of catechesis and prayer.
